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From the Desk of.... Chris Sycks, Coshocton County Auditor: A Tribute to Richard J. Tompkins...

It is with a heavy heart that I write this article, as it is the same day that I received the sad news that one of my friends and mentors died last night. Richard J. Tompkins, the second auditor for whom I worked, was Coshocton County's Auditor from 1982 to 2005. He was retired from the U.S. Air Force and was a

Certified Public Accountant. He continued to come and work for his private accounting firm after he retired from the county all the way up to just a few weeks ago.

Mr. Tompkins was the auditor who computerized the financial records and purchased the first in-house computer system to process them, along with payroll, CAMA, and real estate taxes. The 1985 photo (by Bill Bregar and from the Coshocton Tribune), below, shows the Data General mainframe in front of Cheryl Willis (Chief Deputy Auditor), Richard J. Tompkins, and me. He had chosen me from among existing staff to train to be "Computer Operator" – a precursor to "IT".

He was also a mentor and a good example of an excellent elected official "We don't have problems, only challenges", and encouraged all of his employees to do their best.

Mr. Tompkins was quick to show his core beliefs and ethics in any way he could by extending practical kindnesses. When my children came in for a visit, he always took time to talk to them and even to play with them a little. When a co-worker, who had no immediate family to support her, was sitting at the hospital with her severely ill husband. Mr. Tompkins drove to Columbus to be with her. When a public assistance recipient came in because his voucher didn't make it to our office in time to make the current bill run, Mr. Tompkins asked how much he thought he'd need to make it till the next run, and then took the mon-



ey out of his wallet and handed it to him. He and his wife, Martha, also hosted his whole office for picnics and volleyball games at his home during several summers.

He had a great sense of humor and a quick mind, and he treated everyone with kindness and respect. Mr. Tompkins taught me a lot about the office, accounting, and racquetball, and always had a spotless shine on his shoes thanks to the kit in his office and, I am sure, USAF training. He was a good example for many and I am proud to have known him, worked for him, and continued a friendship with him with the Wednesday morning 'breakfast bunch'. He will be greatly missed – we lost one of the good ones. Fly high, RJT. Till we meet again,



Spotlight on. . .

Family and Children First Council

The Coshocton County Family and Children First Council works to connect the dots for families through a collaborative community council that includes county agencies, the local school districts and other concerned community members. Your county's Family and Children First Council (FCFC) connects the dots to bring resources and services together for improving results for families and children. FCFC helps the community by providing availability, resources and usefulness of services for our county's youth and their families who show they have a high need for help and support from more than one service.

Coshocton County's FCFC employs three full-time and two parttime staff members who provide a variety of services to residents of Coshocton County.

Leane Rohr is the Director and oversees the daily operations of the department. She also facilitates several county-wide coalitions for Coshocton County: Coshocton County Drug Free Coalition, Coshocton County Suicide Prevention Coalition, the Early Childhood Collaborative Committee, and the Family and Children First Council.

Some of the services and supports that the FCFC offers to residents of Coshocton County are:

Creative Options:

Amy Boal is our Multi-System Youth Coordinator who works primarily with the families who are enrolled in our Creative Options


Program. The purpose of the Creative Options process is to provide a place for families with multiple and complex problems, and to effectively address their needs through a process that creates a unique intervention/treatment environment which eliminates duplication and provides both traditional services and builds natural supports through a team based process. The history, strengths, and concerns of the child and family are identified, and the Team Leader will help develop a plan and assist the family and community in meeting the goals of the plan.

Any service provider or family member may make a referral to Creative Options. They can do so by contacting the Amy, or they may complete the referral form located on our website and submit it to our office.

Nurturing Parenting - Parent Education and Coaching

This program is facilitated by Suzanne Tupper, Parent Educator and Ali Bates, Case Manager, and offers a traditional group workshop that focuses on learning or refreshing your parenting skills utilizing the Nurturing Parenting Curriculum as the basis for our workshops. We are currently holding one group workshop per week that is open to all parents who are interested in learning more about connecting with their child. For information about this workshop contact our office.

Coshocton County Department of Job and Family Services contracts with our program to provide parent coaching to families whom they refer for services. This is a new program that we are piloting to work with families who have intensive needs. This model is strength based and utilizes a positive reinforcement model. We meet with families prior to and after family visits to work on (*Continued on Page 5*)

AUDITOR'S SALE TO BE HELD

"Every tract of land foreclosed upon for delinquent taxes or a tax lien that has been properly offered for sale on two separate occasions, not less than two weeks apart & not sold shall be forfeited to the state & the County Auditor will offer it for sale to the highest bidder." Ohio Revised Code 5723.

The next Auditor's Sale will be held at 10:30 a.m. on May 11th at the Courthouse. At the time of this article, there are five manufactured homes and two real estate parcels scheduled to be sold:

Manufactured Homes 008-00026 32780 SR 93, Crawford Twp. 008-00047 32780 SR 93, Crawford Twp. 032-00027 14594 TR 424, Pike Twp. Real Estate 043-00000701-00 820 S. Lawn Ave., Coshocton 043-00004363-00 935 S. 6th St., Coshocton

Parcels go for the best bid, but may not be sold to any person delinquent on real property taxes in the State of Ohio nor for less than the total amount of charges and costs if the highest bidder is the last owner of record or their immediate family member.

Any taxes, charges or costs not covered by the sale will be remitted and all liens are eliminated except for the real estate taxes recovered by the sale. If there is a Federal lien, the Federal Government has "Right of Redemption" and may re-take the property for one year after the original foreclosure was filed. The buyer will receive only the amount he paid at the Auditor's sale and no more regardless of improvements done after the purchase.

The real estate parcels (below, right) are both vacant lots, and can be viewed online on the County GIS at <u>http://gis.coshoctoncounty.net/index.aspx</u> by searching by the parcel number (without the dashes). The manufactured homes are pictured to the left. Land





As a courtesy, adjacent land-owners are notified of the sale via USPS. Anyone planning on bidding must register prior to the sale, so please arrive a few minutes early.





A non-refundable down payment (10% of the total due or \$50, whichever is greater) is collected at the end of the auction. If not paid in full on the date of the sale, the bidder must, within 10 days from the sale, produce and return to the auditor the Certificate of Sale along with any bid balance due and the fees to transfer (\$45 Auditor Deed fee, \$36 Recorder's fee & \$.50 Transfer Fee).

The winning bidders will have a deed in hand for the property within a few days of full payment.

CAAO Legislative Committee Update

County Auditor Chris Sycks continues to serve on the Legislative Committee of the County Auditors' Association of Ohio (CAAO). They work to monitor bills that may negatively affect local taxpayers and county government, suggest legislative proposals, and encourage policies which positively impact them. The committee usually meets the first Wednesday each month. Below are current bills that are of interest to the CAAO.

- HB 3 DataOhio Board Creation. Creates board and online catalog of public data, governs online public records, addresses uniform chart of accounts. Reported out, 3rd Hearing, House Finance Committee.
- HB 24 –*Veterans Organization Tax Exemptions.* To exempt from taxes all property owned by these regardless of use. *Signed by Governor.*
- HB 34 Official Notice Delivery. To allow certain notifications by other than certified mail. 2nd Hearing, Senate Government Oversight & Reform Committee.
- HB 49 Operating Budget. SYF 2018-19 main budget, including a multitude of issues affecting local governments. Consideration of Governor's Vetoes.
- HB 52 Deed Solicitation Regulation. To require certain disclosures and limit charges on mailers selling various "property records" that are public record. Signed by Governor.
- HB 70 Fuel Tax Transparency. Requires our weights & measures inspectors to place stickers on all pumps itemizing taxes. 1st Hearing, House Government Accountability & Oversight Committee.
- HB 102 School Funding Reform. To replace local school levies with a statewide property tax, repeal school income taxes, require certain tax exemptions to reimburse the state for levy loss, require the Treasurer of State to issue bonds to refund school debt, among other items. 2nd Hearing, House Finance Committee.
- HB 104 Tax Refund on Bad Debts. Allows vendors to receive sales tax refunds on credit accounts charged off as uncollectible. In Senate Finance Committee.
- HB 205 Senior Housing Relief. Prohibits tax foreclosures on senior homeowners who have paid current taxes in all but five or fewer tax years. Ist Hearing, House Financial Institutions, Housing and Urban Development.
- HB 295/HB 558 Disabled Veterans-Assistance Dogs. Exempts certain disabled veterans from paying a dog registration fee if proof is included that the dog is an assistance dog. 295-2nd Hearing/558 referred, House Armed Services, Veteran's Affairs & Homeland Security Comm.
 HB 298 – Public Employee Sick Days.

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Coshocton County Family and Children First Council (*Continued from Page 3*) goals, talk about what went well in visits, and where opportunities for growth exist.

The program also offers some additional workshops in conjunction with Juvenile and Common Pleas court. These workshops are open only to those who are court referred for programing. Our Diversion Parenting Program is a workshop that is held with youth and their parents who are currently participating in the Juvenile Court Diversion program. This program focuses on parent and youth connection, taking responsibility for mistakes and family problem solving.

Coshocton County Common Pleas Court provides support for a workshop called Remember the Children for parents who are filing for dissolution or divorce in Coshocton County. This workshop is provided by Family and Children First Council – Nurturing Parenting Staff and William Johnson from Coshocton Family PACT.

Cribs for Kids – Safe Sleep Education

This program is funding through a grant from Ohio Department of Health. The focus of this program is to provide one on one safe sleep education to parents in our county. As part of the program Alexis discusses with parents the ABC's of Safe Sleep (Alone – Back – Crib) and other important factors about safe sleep. At the completion of the program the parent receives a Pack N Play and other safe sleep resources. There is no cost for the program but participants must meet WIC eligibility guidelines (although they do not have to be WIC Participants).

Baby and Me Tobacco Free

This is a smoking cessation program for pregnant women and their partner (if they choose to participate). It consists of a series of four prenatal smoking cessation sessions with the focus being on the pregnant woman quitting smoking by the second session. The sessions focus on teaching the participants coping mechanisms to help them stay tobacco free during and after their baby is born. If the participants are successful in quitting smoking during their pregnancy they are eligible to receive a \$25 diaper/baby wipe voucher for each month they stay tobacco free after their baby is born. This program is provided through a grant from the Ohio Department of Health and there is no cost for participation in the program.

Food for Kids

The Food for Kids program is provided through a grant from the Ohio Department of Health. This program's focus is helping to provide food for students in the County Schools who may be facing food insecurity in their home. This program is coordinated through our office but each school who participates has their own process for packing bags and distributing them to the students. The packs of food are distributed to the students at the end of each school week.

Alexis McKay oversees these last three programs for FCFC.

FINAL NOTICE!

The auditor's office recently sent out several hundred pieces of certified mail to all landowners of property currently receiving the CAUV reduction and from whom a 2018 application was not submitted. Several owners questioned why we 'wasted money' certifying the letters, saying that a phone call or email would have been cheaper. We were also asked why we 'threatened' them with the red **FINAL NOTICE** along with the [sometimes large] recoupment charges listed on the notice.

Ohio Revised Code requires certified mail notification, including recoupment amounts, to any landowner with no application on file by the deadline. Phone calls or emails would not satisfy the law, and a certified letter would still be required.

As for the FINAL NOTICE insert, we have tried letters in the past, which seem to be ignored. We want all qualifying farmers to receive the reduction they deserve. This is an attention-getting gimmick that highlights the savings that would have to be returned if the application is not filed.

Courthouse Lighting Project

A member of the Coshocton County Board of Developmental Disabilities (Coshocton DD) has become the first person with a developmental disability to also serve as a trustee of the Ohio Association of County Boards (OACB), a statewide advocacy and trade group.

Coshocton resident Shikara Robbins receives support from Coshocton DD and has served on the county agency's governing board since April 2016. Robbins' application to become an OACB trustee was accepted in March. She will serve concurrently on both boards.

In her new role, Robbins will help guide OACB's priorities for 2018. She will represent OACB's East Central region, which includes 11 counties, at board meetings and statewide events. Robbins said being a person with a disability means she can provide real-world insight into how Ohio's DD support system can be continuously improved for the people, families, and communities it serves.

"I can help others see how programs should operate to meet the needs of people like me," Robbins said. "I look forward to participating in activities and meetings outside of Coshocton County as a way to learn about new opportunities and speak up about concerns that affect people with disabilities and their families."



- HB 310 Elected Official Concealed Carry. Permitting an elected official to carry a handgun in a government facility if he/she holds a valid license. In House Federalism & Interstate Relations Committee.
- HB 312 Local Government Credit Cards. Regarding use of credit cards and debit cards by political subdivisions. 3rd Hearing, Senate Government Oversight & Reform Committee.
- HB 323/SB 181 Garbage Collection Fees. Authorizes municipalities to certify these fees to the Auditor as a special assessment. HB Reported out, 3rd Hearing, House State and Local Govt. Comm.; SB Amended, 3rd Hearing, Senate Ways and Means Committee.

BOARD OF REVISION UPDATES

Ohio Revised Code Section 5715.02 establishes the Board of Revision (BOR) for the taxpayer to have process to challenge the value set on his or her property for tax purposes. The Board consists of the county treasurer, the auditor, and one commissioner. This year's BOR had 52 complaints filed in a timely manner to address. Taxpayers are able to appeal the BOR's decision at the Common Pleas Court (CPC) or Ohio Board of Tax Appeals (BTA). Following are the open appeals.



The 2018 Board of Revision has received 66 complaints for 2017 tax year. Besides statutory notifications, the first step in the process is the Auditor will send out her appraisers to view each property and make sure our records accurately reflect the parcels' characteristics. If anything needs changed that will affect the value, a preliminary offer will be given to the landowner. If the offer is accepted, the process is complete; if the offer is declined, or if no offer is given, hearings will be scheduled, beginning sometime in May. Tax Incentive Review Council

The Tax Incentive Review Council (TIRC) meets every March to make sure that any development receiving tax incentives or abatements are fulfilling the initial agreement for those tax breaks. The council is made up of the County Commissioners, representatives of the school district(s), township(s), and any municipality in which the incentives exist, and the County Auditor, who acts as statutory chair of the TIRC.

Coshocton County's TIRC met on March 19 to review the Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) and the two existing Enterprise Zones (EZ). There are currently no participants in the CRA (see article, page 7), and there are two EZs - General Foods Corporation (Kraft Food Groups) and McWane Inc. (McWane Poles). Both of the EZ participants have exceeded their initial commitment of jobs, payroll, and investment. McWane Poles is receiving a ten year, 100% abatement with PILOT beginning with tax year 2014, saving \$129K to date on real estate improvements of \$2.3 million. Kraft is receiving a ten year, 75% abatement with Local Jobs Grant 50% Income Tax Abatement beginning with tax year 2016, saving \$423K to date on \$16 million. Both real estate tax abatements are only on the new construction involved with the project. Below are what the initial job agreements and current numbers reflect. The TIRC voted to continue both of the EZs with no modification.
