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INTRODUCTION

The material in this report is an update of the 1998 Coshocton County Collaborative Community Assessment. This update was undertaken at the behest of a collaborative initiative of three agencies in Coshocton County: Head Start, Department of Jobs and Family Services, and Department of Maternal and Child Health. It contains community needs, health, economic, educational and demographic data. An on-line, resource directory sponsored by the Coshocton County Department of Jobs and Family Services is being developed and will soon be available for use by all agencies and the general public in Coshocton County.

The purpose of this initiative remains the same as stated in the Mission Statement in the Coshocton County Collaborative Assessment conducted in 1998—to *improve community wellness through a collaborative effort focused on carrying out a community needs and resource assessment and a plan of action for a collaborative effort in addressing community needs.* Material contained in this report and in the on-line Resource Directory sponsored by the Coshocton County Department of Jobs and Family Services is meant to assist community agencies, and the community as a whole, in identifying and analyzing problems, needs and concerns, and organizational resources for improving the health and wellness of all Coshocton County residents.

Mission Statement

Improve community wellness through a collaborative effort focused on carrying out a community needs and resource assessment and a plan of action for a collaborative effort in addressing community needs.

Most of the information reported in 1998 has been revised and reformatted in an effort to provide the user with the most current and up-to-date data.

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THE ASSESSMENT PLAN

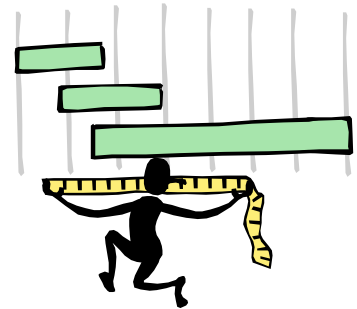

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COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT PROCESS

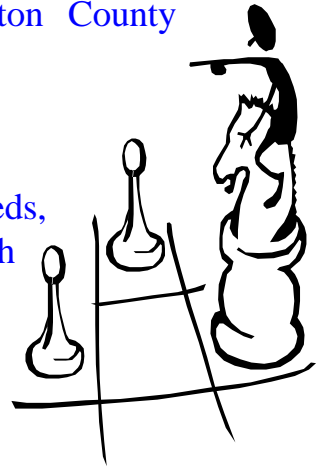
As in the 1998 Coshocton County Collaborative Assessment, the 2004 Assessment employed a PARTICIPATORY approach in organizing, planning and conducting the assessment. Coshocton County Agencies were invited to recommend revisions to the 1998 Assessment. The intended result was to ensure, through community effort, that the end product was community driven.

ASSESSMENT IMPLEMENTATION

Surveys were conducted to determine the needs of Coshocton County residents in the following areas of investigation:

Education, health, nutrition, and social service

Data on the education, health, nutrition, and social service needs, concerns and problems of the community were collected through the use of written questionnaires.



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SUMMARY

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

POPULATION

The population of Coshocton County has increased from 35,427 in 1990 to an estimated 36,836 in 2002.

POVERTY

Between 1990 and 2000, the overall poverty rate in Coshocton County decreased from 13.2% to 9.1% (Ohio's poverty rate in 2000 was 10.6%). The child poverty rate, ages 0-17, went from 25.0 in December 2000 to 29.9 in July 2001. As per 2000 Census data, the poverty rate in Coshocton County for female headed households was 30.45%. This is over 7 times greater than the poverty rate for married couple households at 4.71%. Family type appears to be an important determinant of poverty.

CHILD CARE

The monthly average of working poor families receiving child care assistance increased from 129 in 1995 to 283 in 2003. Working welfare/transitional families receiving child care assistance showed a decrease from 91 families in 1995 to 43 in 2003.

ECONOMIC PROFILE

WORKING POOR

Review of available data suggests that a significant percent of working families may not generate sufficient earnings to support themselves.

JOBS

In Coshocton County, for every quarter from 1st quarter 2001 to 2nd quarter 2003, jobs were lost. Job Growth from 2nd quarter 2000 to 2nd quarter 2002 was a -1,401 (minus one thousand four hundred one) jobs.

REAL MEAN INCOME OF TAX RETURN BY SCHOOL DISTRICT

As reported by the Council for Economic Opportunities in Greater Cleveland, incomes in Coshocton County school districts have continued to fall during the last 16 years. The income of an average Ohio taxpayer has increased 5% in the last 16 years while Coshocton County has decreased by 7%. From 1986 to 2001, the decrease for Coshocton County was 5.2% (Ohio increased 5.9%) with River View Local increasing 2.6%, and

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Ridgewood Local and Coshocton decreasing 2.5 and 8.3 respectively.

REAL MEAN EARNINGS OF MANUFACTURING JOBS

From 2000 to 2001, the real mean earnings in Coshocton County for manufacturing jobs declined by .9%.

UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS

NEW CLAIMS FOR UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Year to date 2002-2003, new unemployment claims increased by 34.1% for Coshocton County. Comparing year-to-date figures for 2003 (2,863) and 2004 (2,927), there was a 2.2% increase in unemployment claims.

EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR

All employment sectors, with the exception of small increases in construction, wholesale trade, information, finance and insurance, and educational services saw a decrease in average annual employment from 2000 to 2001. In the manufacturing sector, from 2001-2004, Coshocton County had a total loss of 463 jobs (11.5% loss).

HOUSEHOLD INCOME

The median household income in 1999 for Coshocton County was \$34,701, up from \$26,908 in 1994.

HOUSING

The 2000 Census reports the median value of a house in Coshocton County is \$79,300. From 1980 to 1990, the real mean value of owner occupied housing in Coshocton County had dropped from \$51,878 to \$44,500, a decrease of -14.2% (Ohio's loss 2.7%).>

EDUCATIONAL PROFILE

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Ohio report cards use multiple measures to determine each district's designation. The designations are: excellent, effective, continuous improvement, academic watch or academic emergency. Eighteen (18) state indicators which include statewide proficiency assessments, graduation rates and attendance rates are used to determine designation as well as federal Adequate Yearly Progress determination and Performance Index Score. All three districts in the region (Coshocton City, Ridgewood and River View Local) received effective designations.

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HEALTH STATISTICS

TEEN BIRTHS

In 2002, the teen birth rate (per 1,000 women in specified age group) for 15-17 year olds was 19.0 (Ohio 19.9). This was an increase from 2001 when the rate was 16.6. Teen mothers ages 18 & 19 had a rate decrease, going from 102.7 in 2001 to 76.2 in 2002 (Ohio 68.9).

INFANT DEATHS

The Infant and Child Mortality rate decreased from 9.7 in 1998 to 6.5 in 2002 (Ohio 7.9).

SMOKING

The rate of births to mothers who smoke in Coshocton County in 2002 was 24.9 (Ohio 17.9). This is a decrease from the rate of 27.6 in 2001. However, both years saw an increase from 1997 when the rate was 23.9.

LEADING CAUSES OF DEATH

In 2000-2002, the five leading causes of death in Coshocton County were: Diseases of the Heart, Malignant Neoplasms, Cerebrovascular Disease, Chronic Lower Respiratory Diseases, and Accidents (Unintentional Injuries).

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

Poverty, substance abuse, inadequate housing, teen pregnancy and the lack of educational success are critical factors in child abuse, neglect and maltreatment.

In 2001, there were 398 new reports of child abuse and neglect cases in Coshocton County compared to 370 cases in 1995.

LEAD

Very severe lead exposure in children (blood levels of 80 ug/dL or greater) can cause coma, convulsions and death. Lower levels cause adverse effects on the central nervous system and kidneys. Blood lead levels as low as 10 ug/dL, which do not cause distinctive symptoms, are associated with decreased intelligence and impaired neurobehavioral development. Decreased stature or growth has also been associated with these lower blood levels. In 2003, a total of 373 children in Coshocton County were tested for lead—365 were under 10 ug/dL with 8 have elevated levels.

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INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR CHILDREN BELOW 19

The number of children receiving Healthy Start/Medicaid increased 390%, from 548 in January 1997 to 2,683 in January 2002—the latter figure representing 28% of the county's total child population (Ohio 25).

SPECIAL NEEDS

The estimated number of working age (16-64) Coshocton County residents with disabilities in 2000 was 4,426, or 19.4% of the total working age population (Ohio as a whole had 16.9%). In Coshocton County, the number of persons and type of disability were: 655 with sensory; 1,619 with physical; 865 with mental; 446 self-care; 1,361 going outside the home; and 2,677 with employment disability. The total number of disabled children (21 and under) in Coshocton County in 2000 was

DEATH, ILLNESS AND INJURY INDICATORS

There are 17 indicators for death, illness and injury. Coshocton County had 4 better than Ohio, 7 equal to and 6 with rates lower than Ohio's.

BEHAVIORAL RISK SURVEY

There are 11 categories in this survey for which data is collected. Coshocton County had one category where they did better than Ohio, one equal to and nine with lower percentages than Ohio.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH INDICATORS

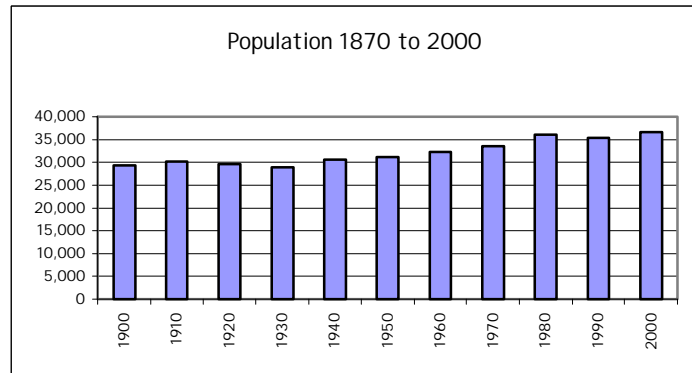
There are 12 indicators in the Maternal and Child Health survey. Coshocton County did better than Ohio in 7 of the 12 indicators with 3 equal to and 2 lower than Ohio.

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COSHOCTON COUNTY DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

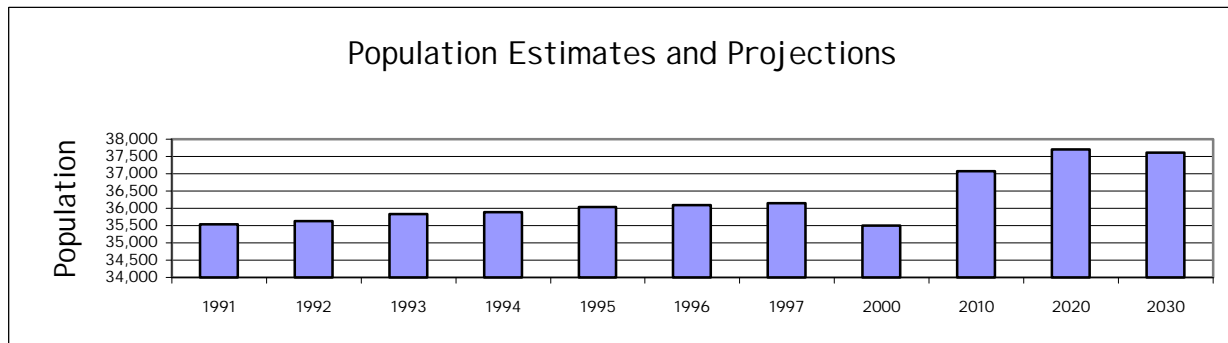
POPULATION 1900-2000

The 2000 census indicates that the population of Coshocton County has increased to 36,655 from 35,427 in 1990. The largest net change in population since 1900 was from 1970 to 1980, when there was an increase of 2,548 persons or 7.6%. Current estimated projections show a further increase in population to 37,074 by 2010 and 37,696 in 2020. By 2030, however, the population estimates show a slight decrease with population at 37,605.

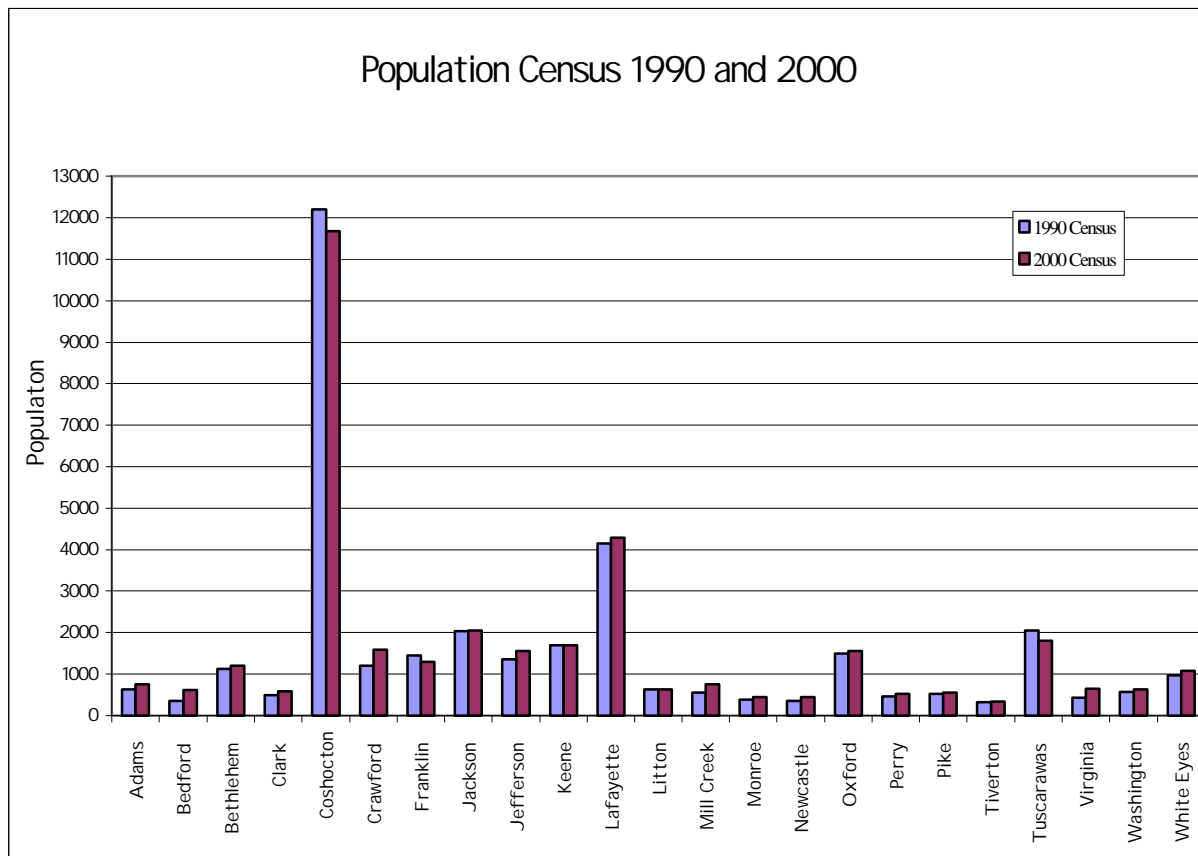

1990-2000 POPULATION CENSUS COMPARISONS BY COUNTY SUBDIVISIONS CHART



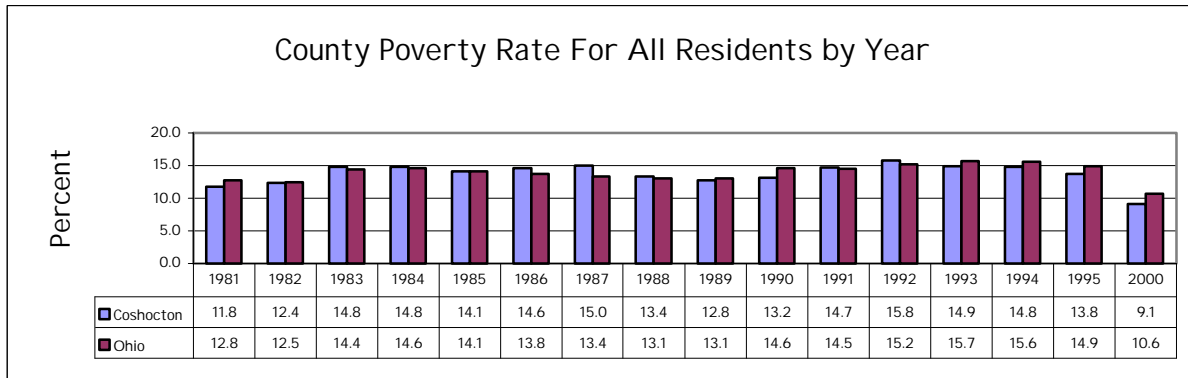

POVERTY

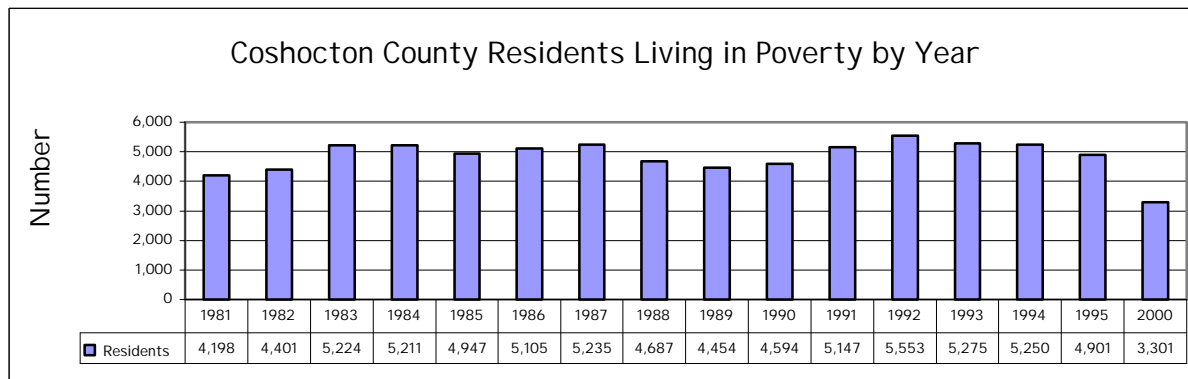
The overall incidence of poverty for all age groups in 2000 was 9.1%—nearly 3,301 Coshocton County residents were living in poverty. Since 2000, poverty rates throughout Ohio have steadily increased—in 2003, Ohio was 12.1.

CHILD POVERTY

CHILD POVERTY AND CENSUS UNDERREPORTED POOR CHILDREN 0-17 YEARS

The 2000 Census indicates there were 1,014 poor children (ages 0-17) in Coshocton County out of a total of 9,490 for a poverty rate of 10.7%. The Ohio Department of Jobs and Family Services database (CRIS-E) used for tracking enrollees, reports that there was an unduplicated count of 1,237 children receiving OWF, DA, Food Stamps, Healthy Start and Medicaid during the same period (April 2000). Using CRIS-E, the poverty rate for children is 13.0. The number of children in Coshocton County missed in the 2000 Census is calculated at 223, the difference between 1,237 (number of children receiving some sort of welfare benefit) and 1,014 (number of poor children reported in the 2000 Census).

CHILDREN 0-17 BELOW 100% POVERTY IN 1990 CENSUS AND CRIS-E WELFARE DATABASE

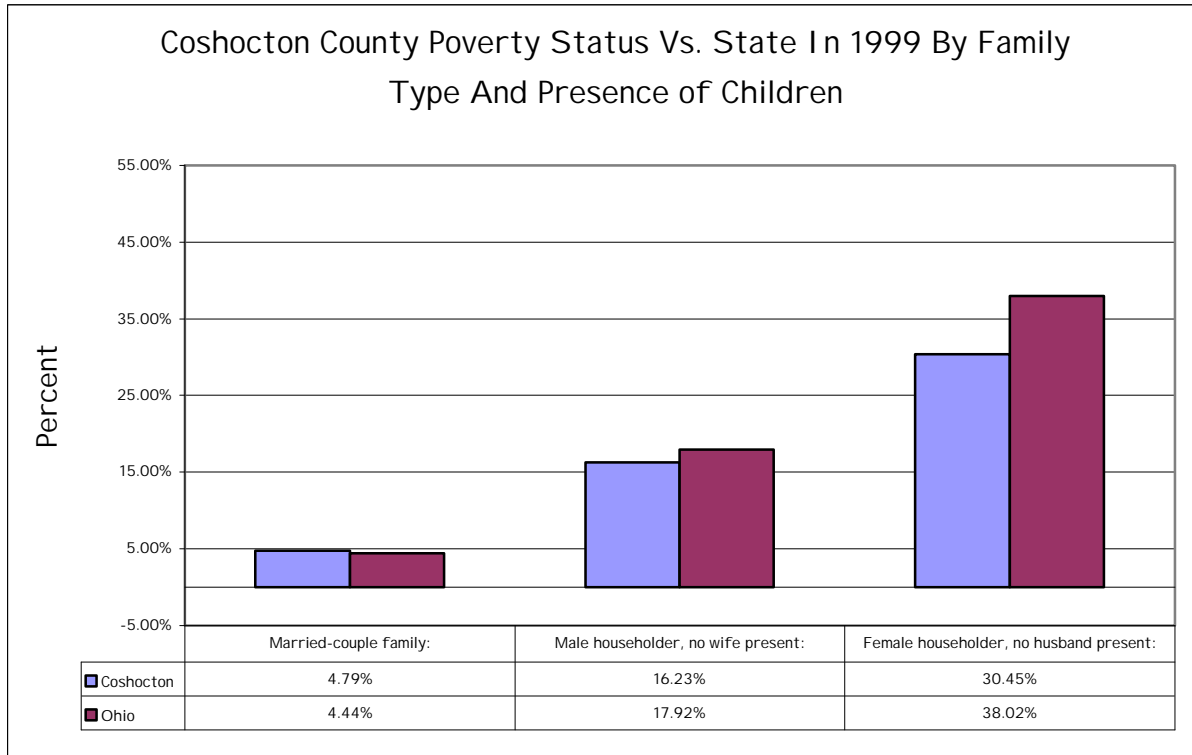

POVERTY BY FAMILY TYPE AND PRESENCE OF CHILDREN

In 1999, Coshocton County female households with children and no husband present had a poverty rate of 30.45% compared with a rate of 4.71 for married couple households. It is clear that family type is a major determinant of poverty status. The chart below highlights this phenomena.

WELFARE REFORM IN COSHOCTON COUNTY

During the time that poverty was increasing, there was a large decrease in the number of children in Coshocton County who received OWF cash assistance. The following charts show percent of children, 3-4 and 0-17, who received OWF cash assistance from April 1997 to July 2001.

The number of 3 and 4 year old children at 100% poverty enrolled in CRIS-E in July 2001 was 197 (an underestimate because not all poor children enroll in CRIS-E). The number of poor children has steadily increased from April 1999 to July 2001. Although recent data is unavailable for number of children enrolled in CRIS-E, we can assume that the number of poor children in Coshocton County is on the rise due to loss of jobs, increase in Unemployment Insurance Claims and enrollment in FNS (formerly Food Stamps).

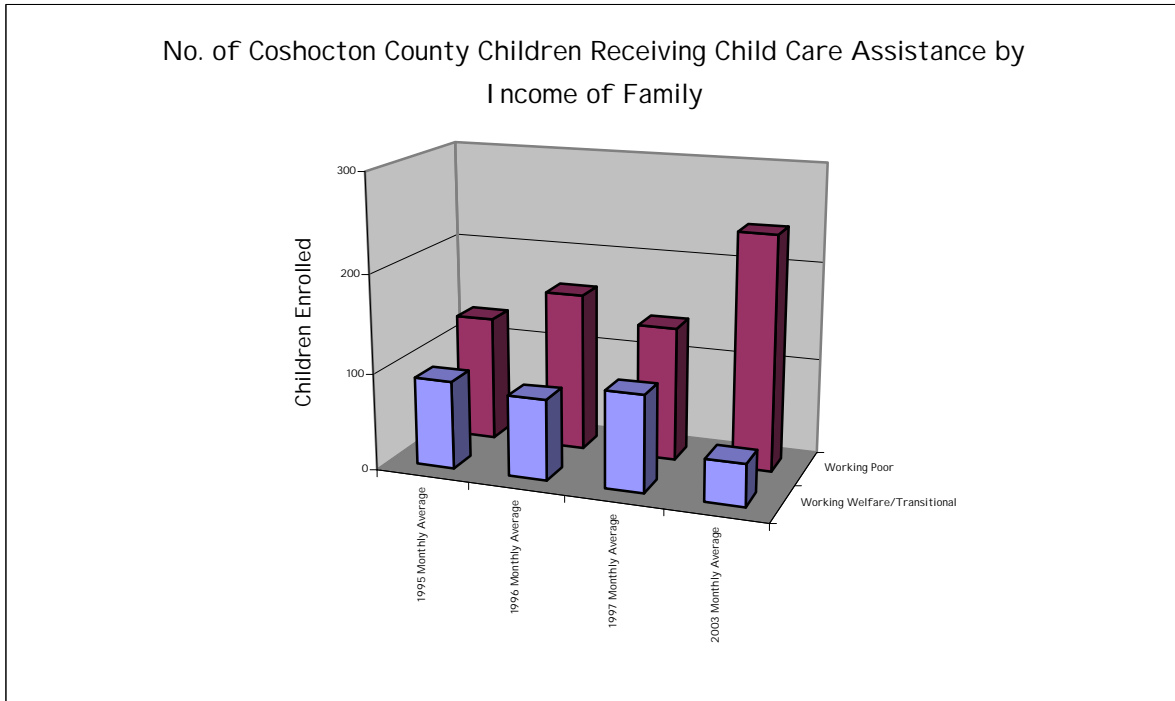
Comparing job growth rates and welfare cuts in Coshocton County for the period 1st Quarter 2003 to 1st Quarter 2004, there was a loss 162 jobs and 29 families cut from OWF cash assistance. This is a total of 191 OWF cuts exceeding job gain.

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COSHOCTON COUNTY CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE 1995-1995 AND 2003

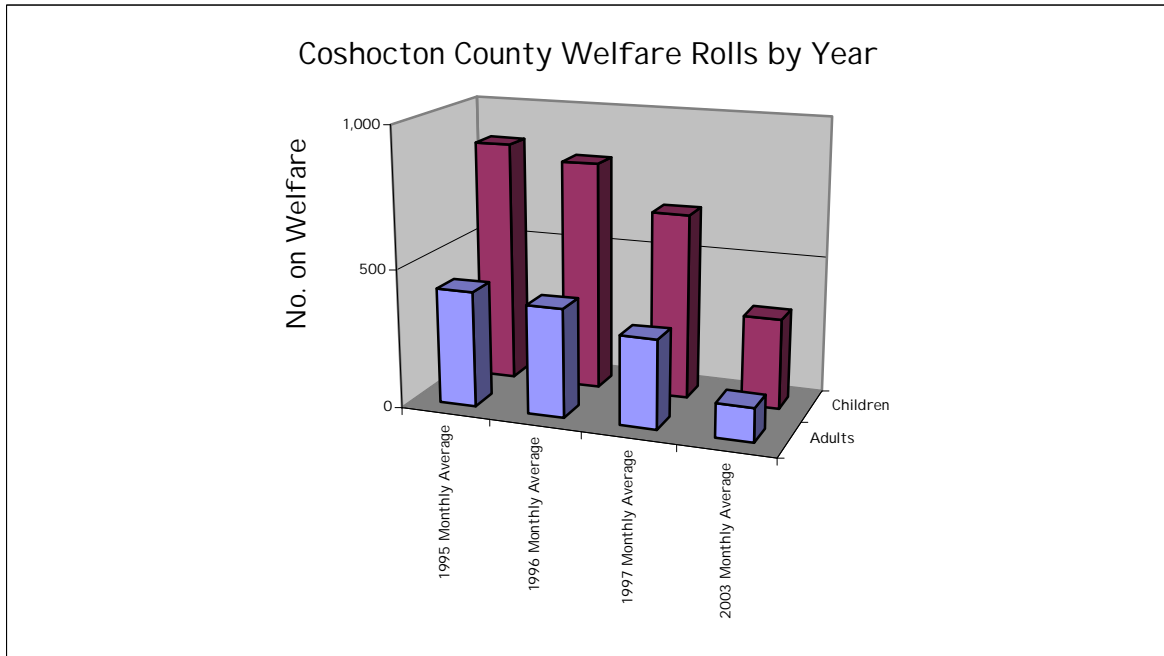

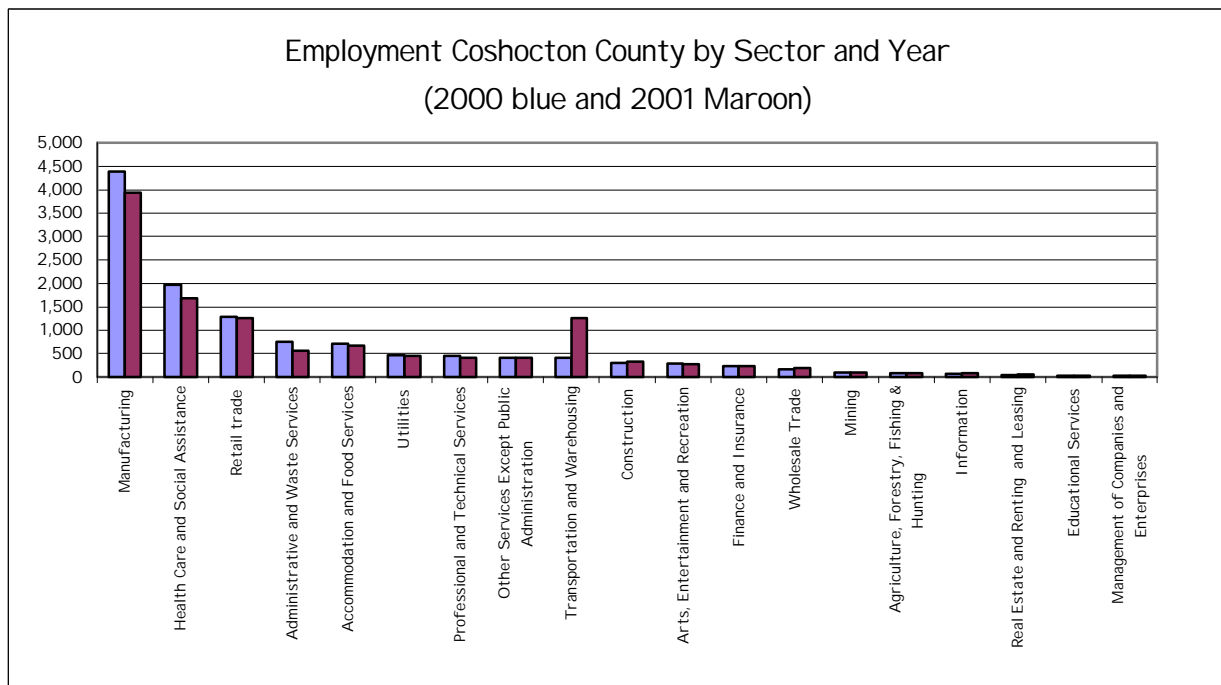
EMPLOYMENT AND ANNUAL SALARY BY SECTOR

According to the Ohio Department of Development Office of Strategic Research, an average of 16,600 employed in the civilian labor force in Coshocton County during 2002—down from 17,600 in 1998. More than 1,100 workers were unemployed. The County's unemployment rate of 6.9% exceeded the average for the State at 5.7.

EMPLOYMENT BY SECTOR AND YEAR

The average annual employment for Coshocton County in 2001 was 12,849—down from 13,904 in 2000. The majority of private sector jobs saw decreases, going from a total of 12,252 in 2000 to 11,208 in 2001. The following areas showed small increases in jobs: construction, wholesale trade, information, finance and insurance, and educational services. In all other areas, there were decreases—the manufacturing industry went from 4,425 in 2000 to 3,925 in 2001. There were also decreases in Local, State and Federal Government jobs.

CHANGE IN NUMBER EMPLOYED BY SECTOR 2000 AND 2001

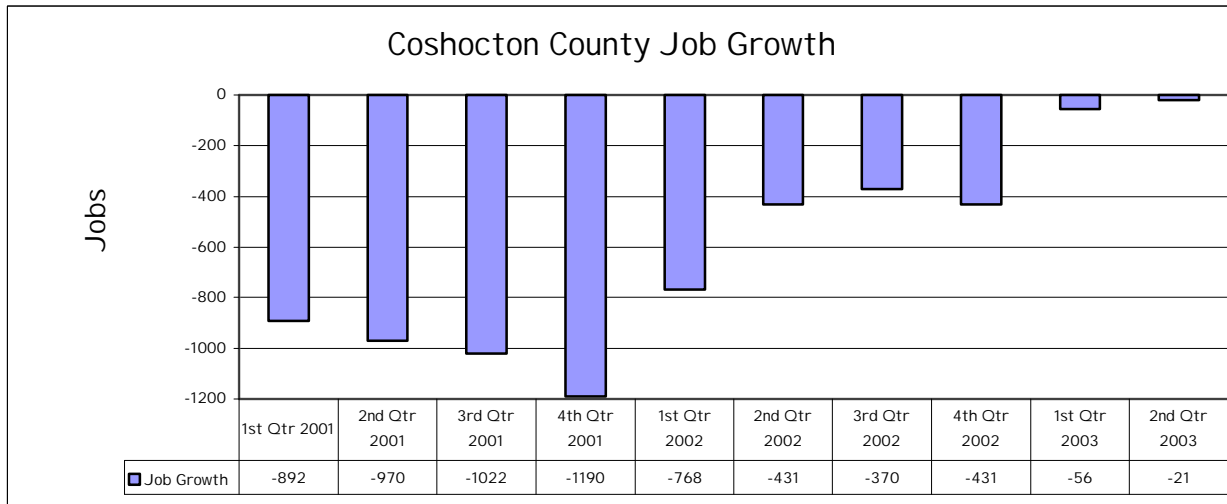

From 2000 to 2002, the real mean income of a tax return in Coshocton County was 7.6%. River View Local School District saw 6.5% decrease, Ridgewood Local 4.5%, and Coshocton 4.4%. 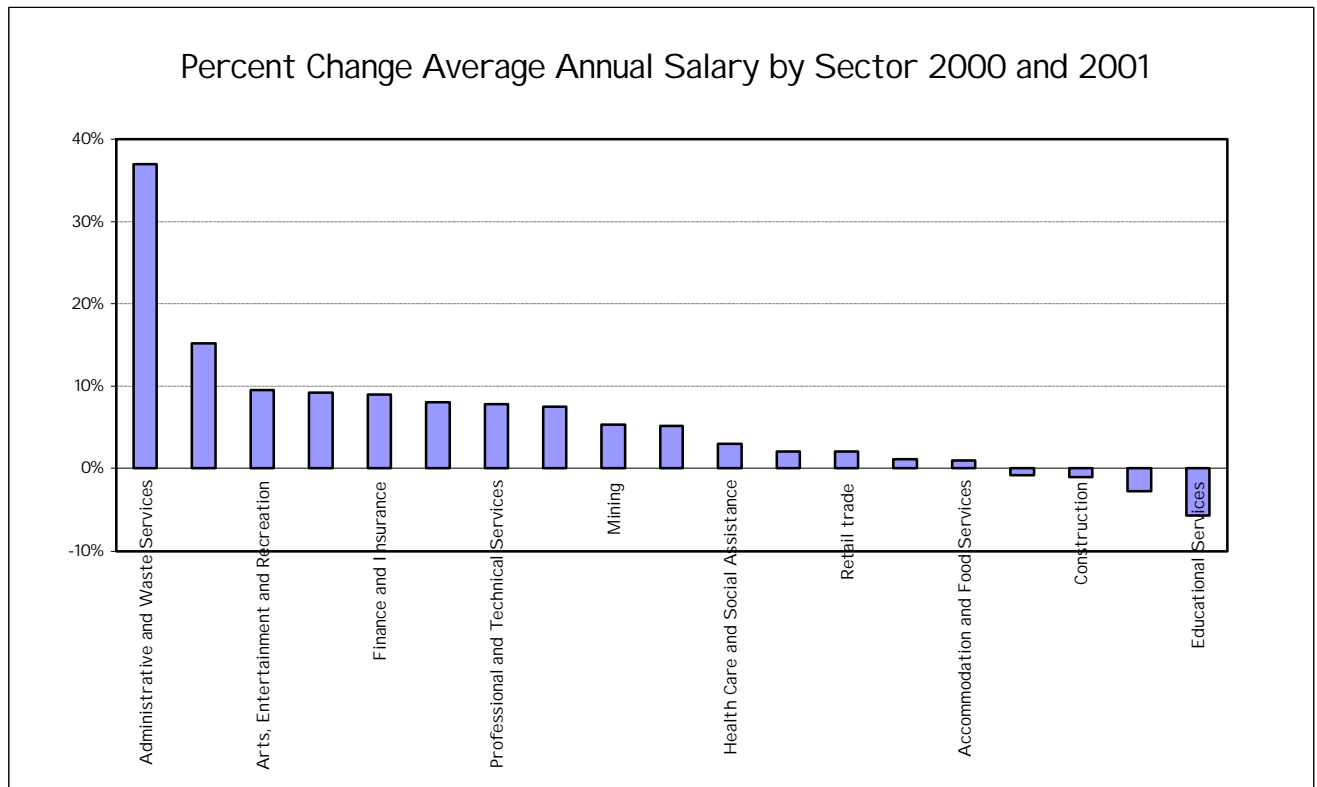

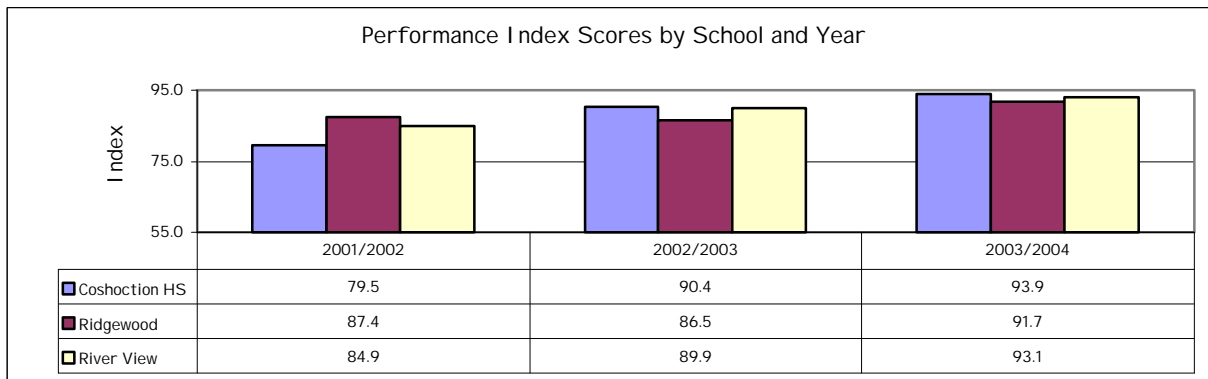

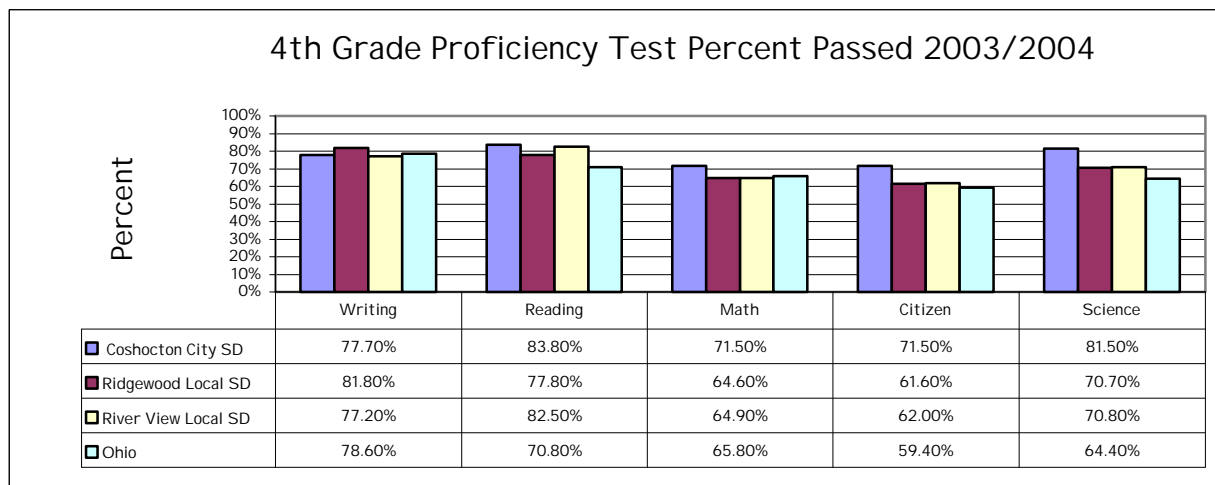
PERFORMANCE INDEX SCORES BY SCHOOL DISTRICTS 2003/2004

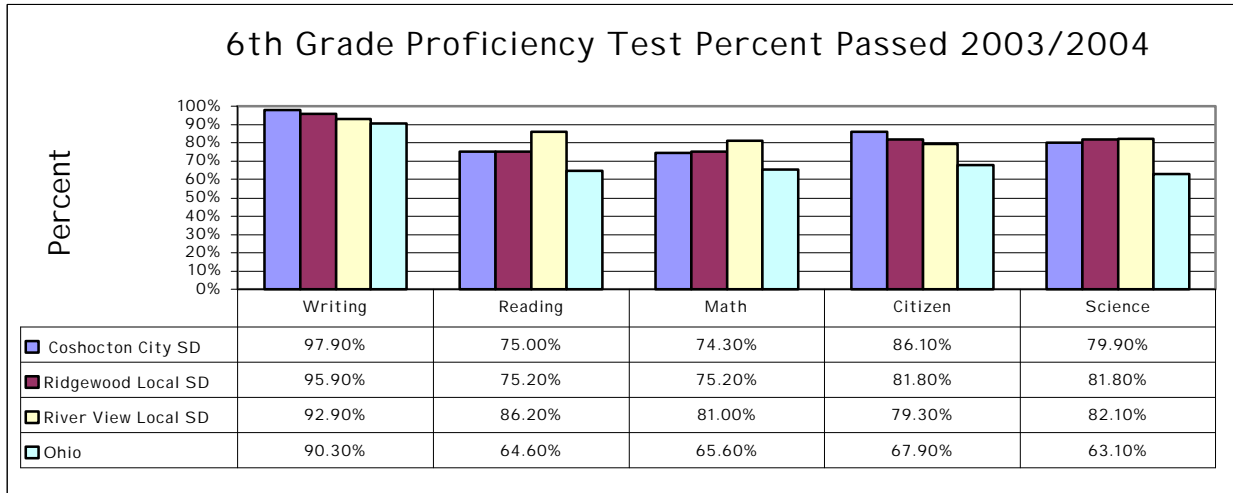
PROFICIENCY TESTS SCORES BY SCHOOL DISTRICT 2003/2004

Results of 4th, 6th and 9th grade proficiency tests are broken out by the four subject areas—writing, reading, mathematics, citizenship, and science.

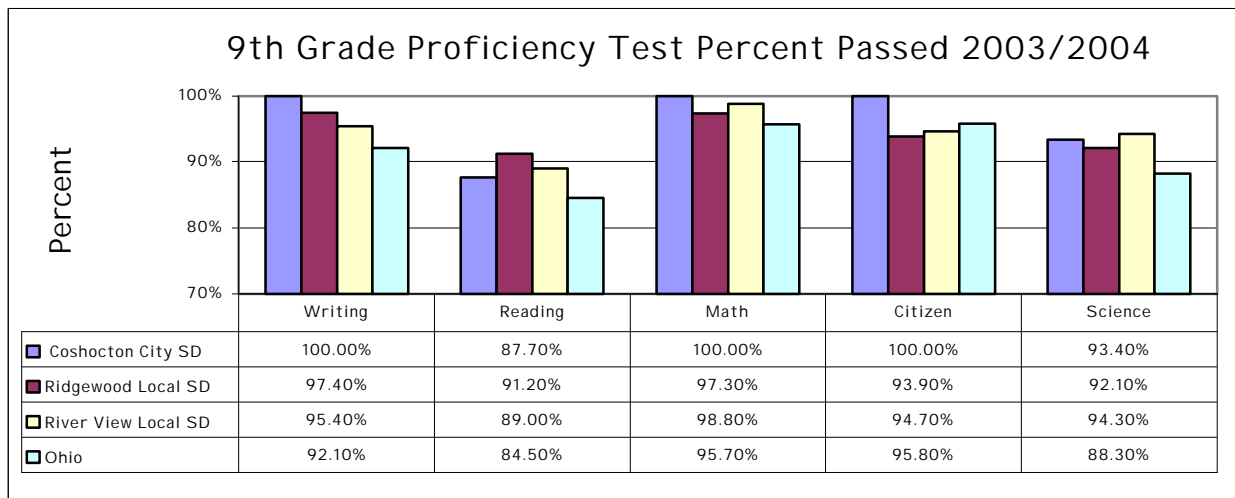

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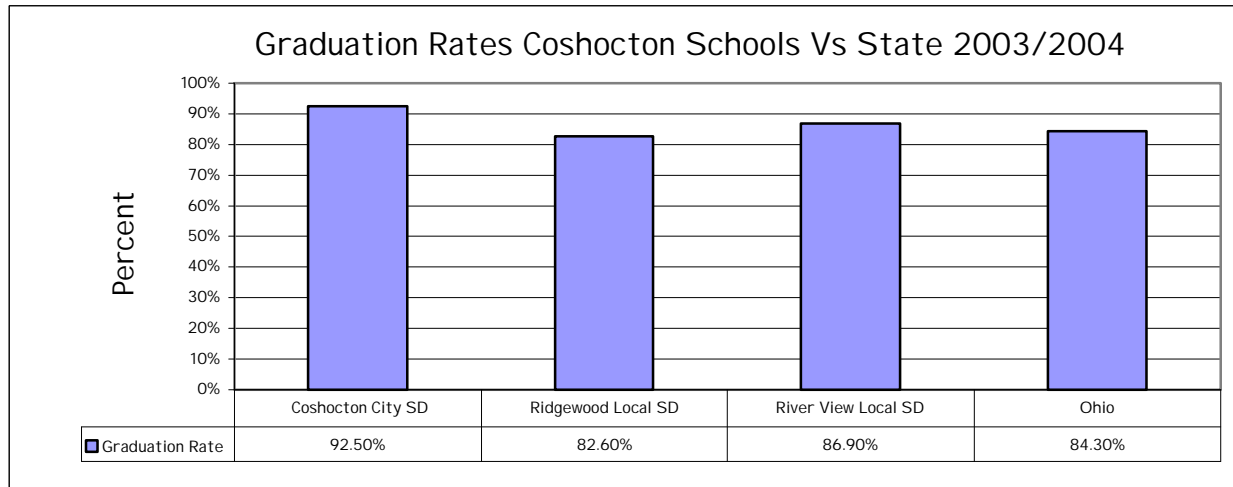

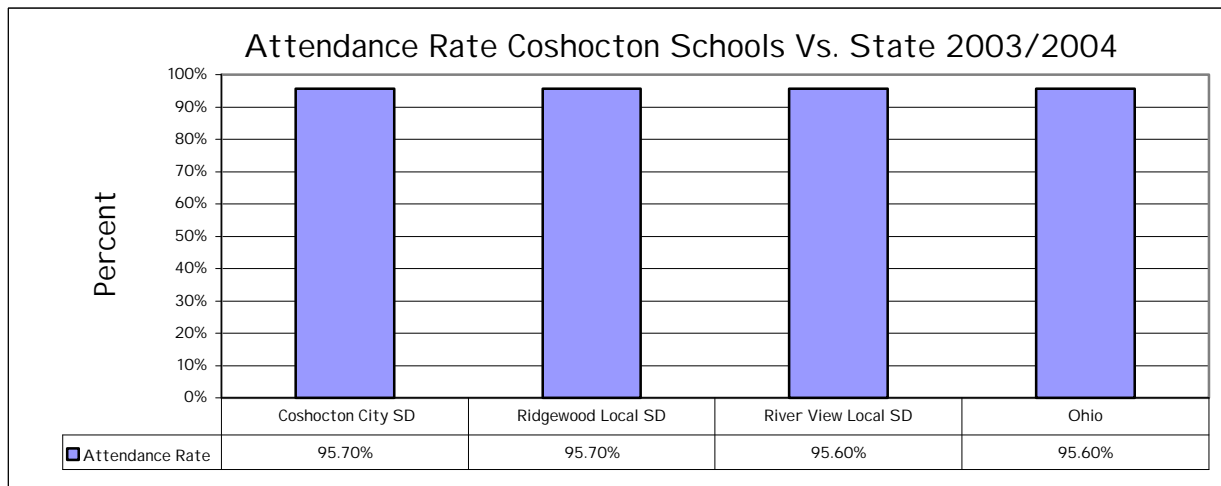
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GRADUATION RATE BY SCHOOL DISTRICT 2003/2004

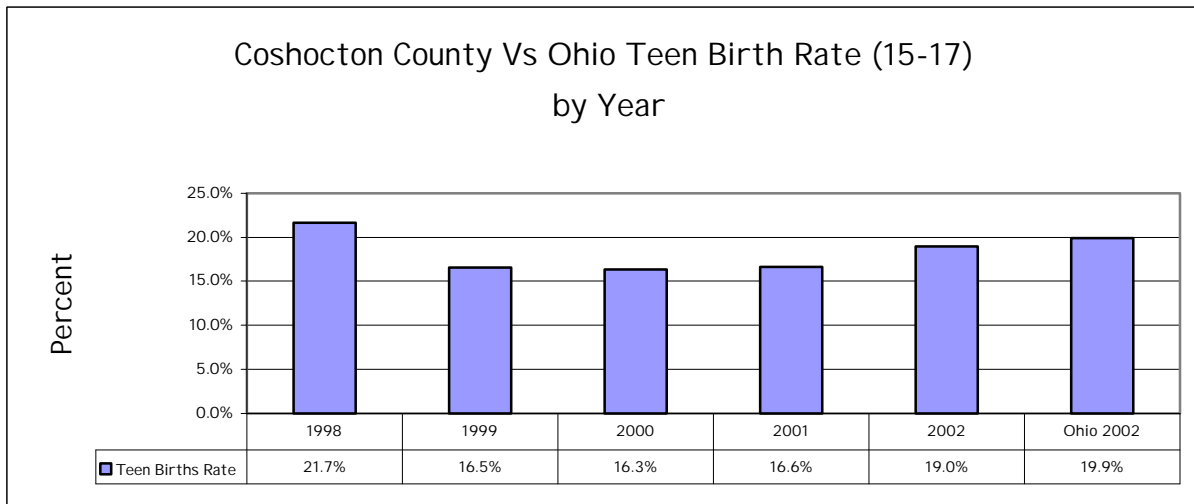

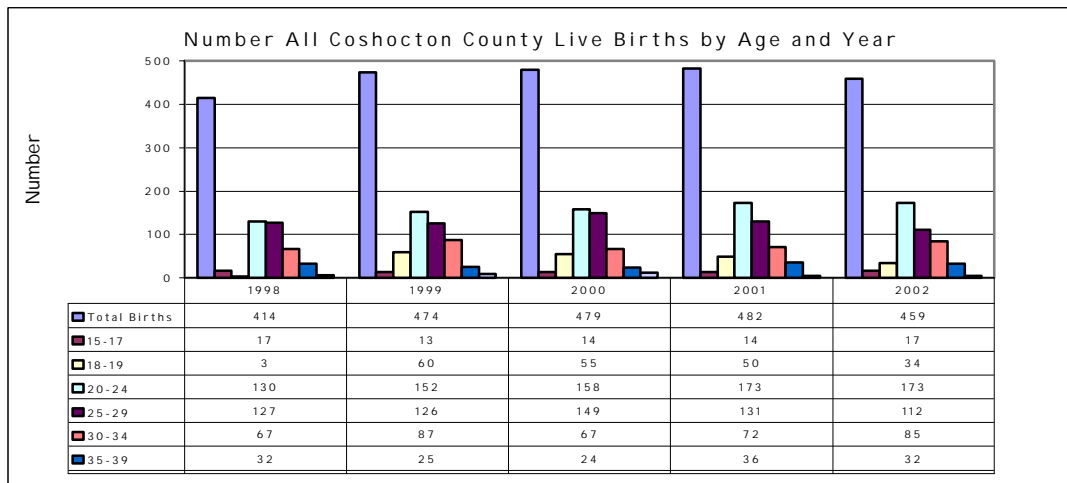

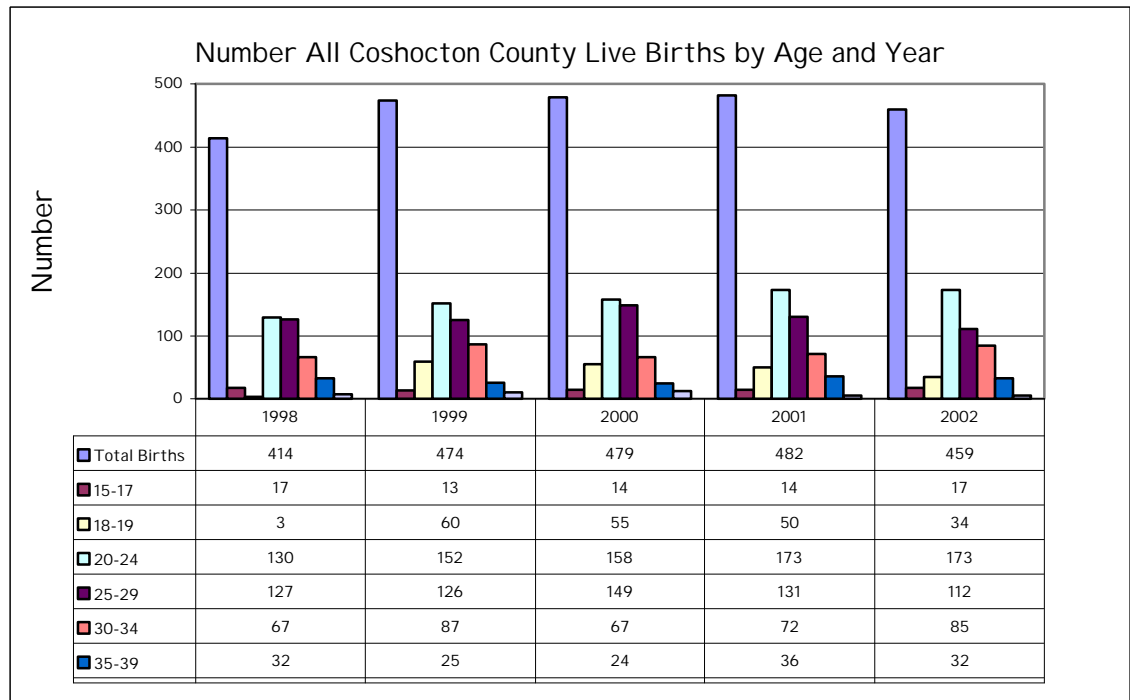
COSHOCTON COUNTY TEEN BIRTH RATE 18 -19

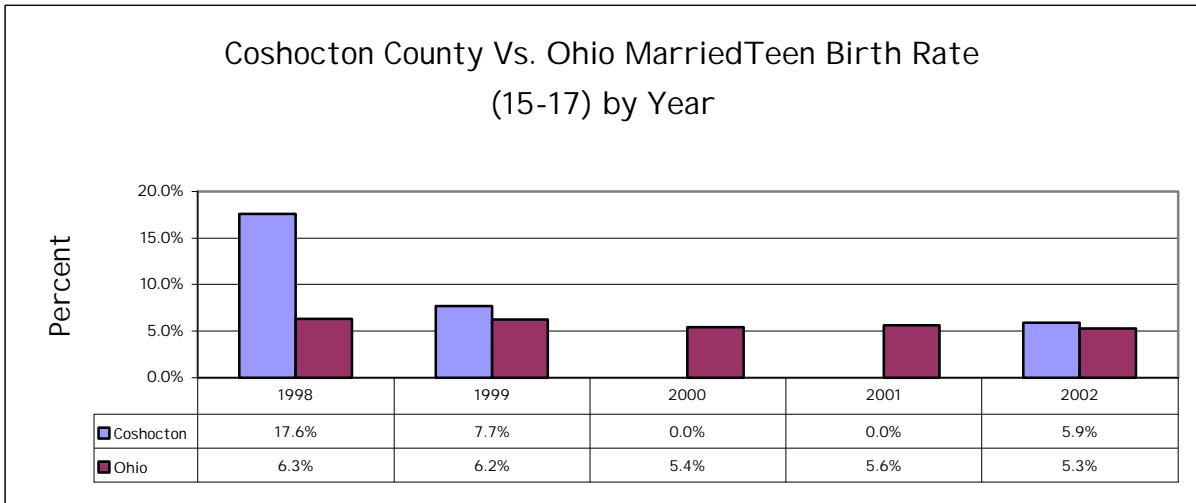
ALL BIRTHS COSHOCTON COUNTY BY AGE AND YEAR 1998-2002

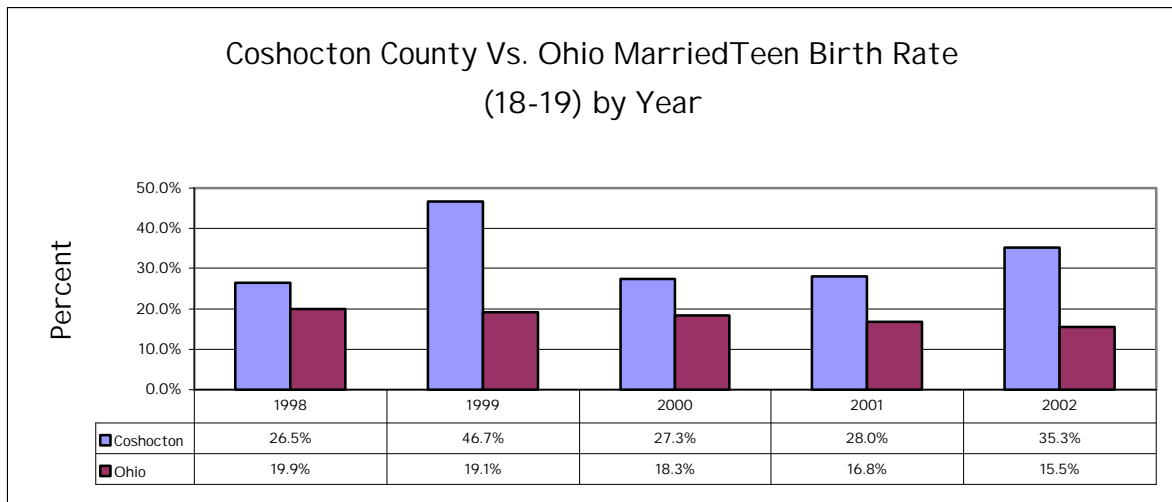
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MARRIED TEEN MOTHERS 15-17 YEARS

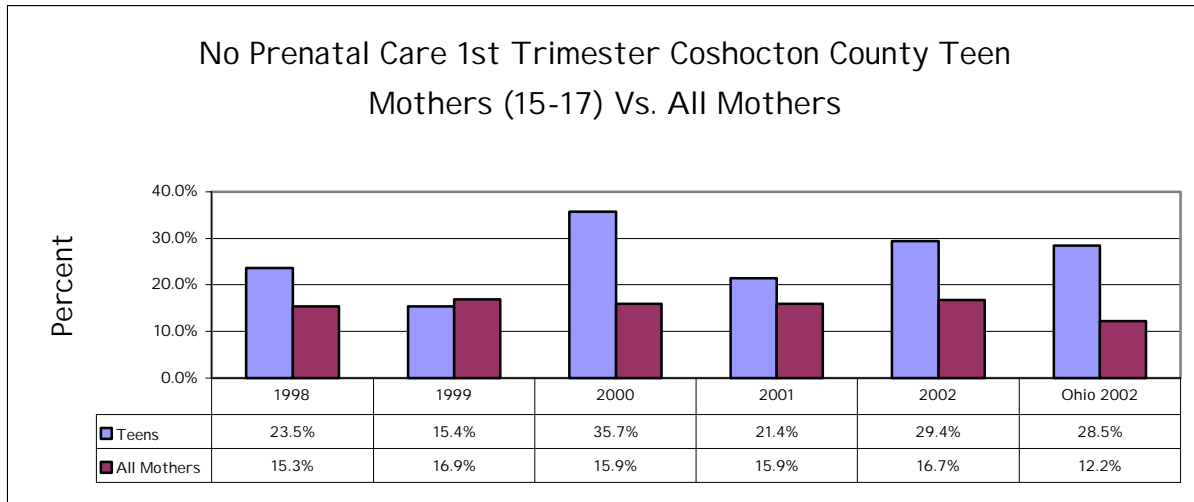
MARRIED TEEN MOTHERS 18-19 YEARS

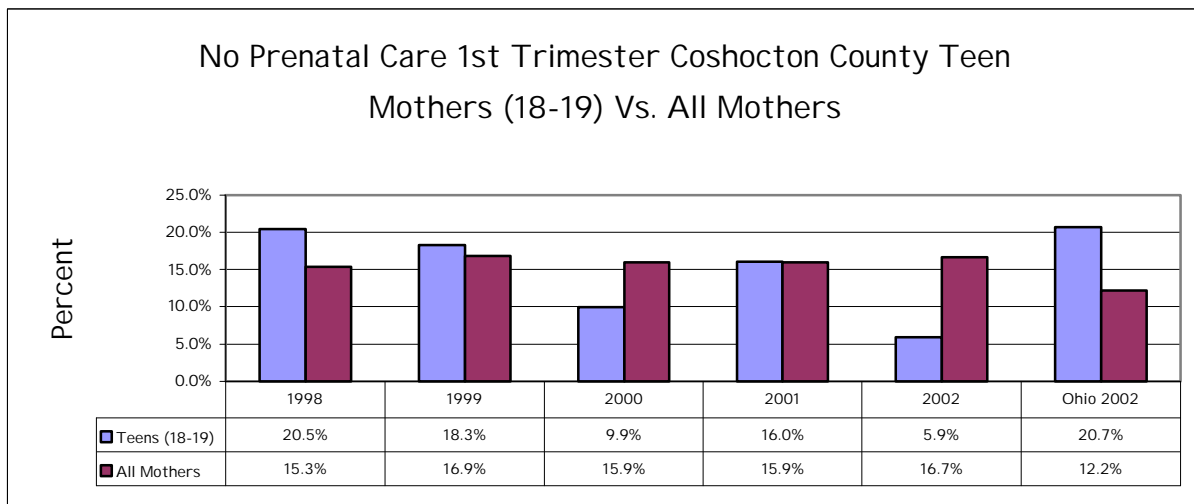

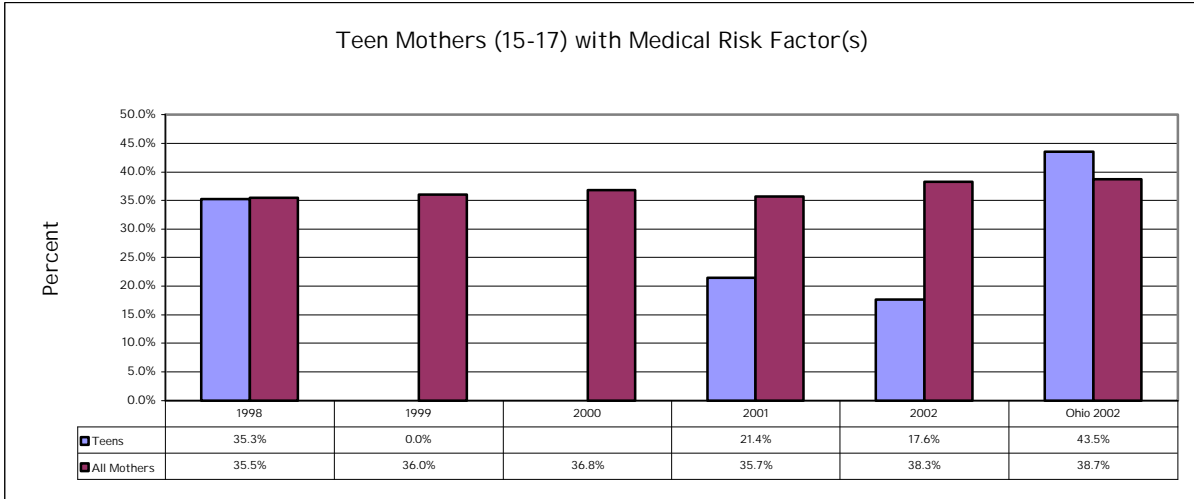
NO 1ST TRIMESTER CARE TEEN MOTHER 18-19 YEARS VS. ALL MOTHERS

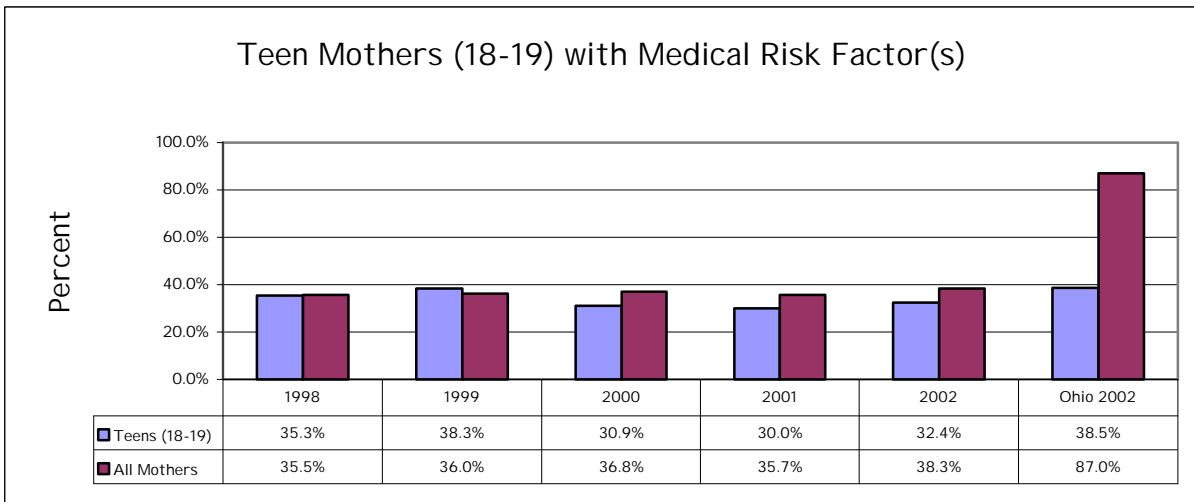

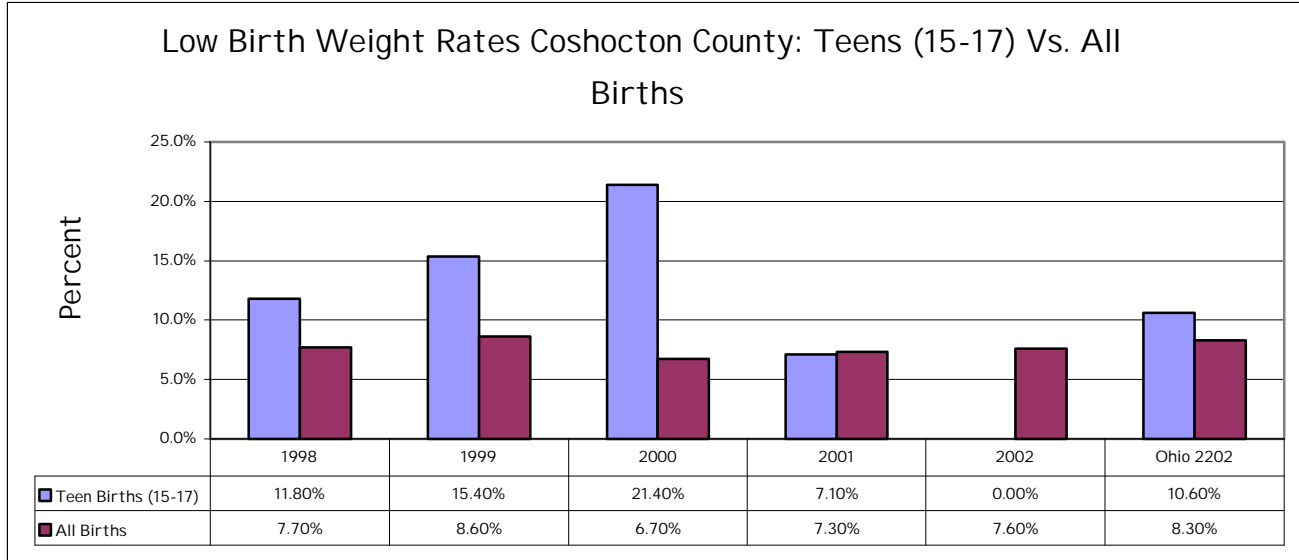
TEEN MOTHERS 18-19 WITH MEDICAL RISK FACTOR(S) VS. ALL MOTHERS

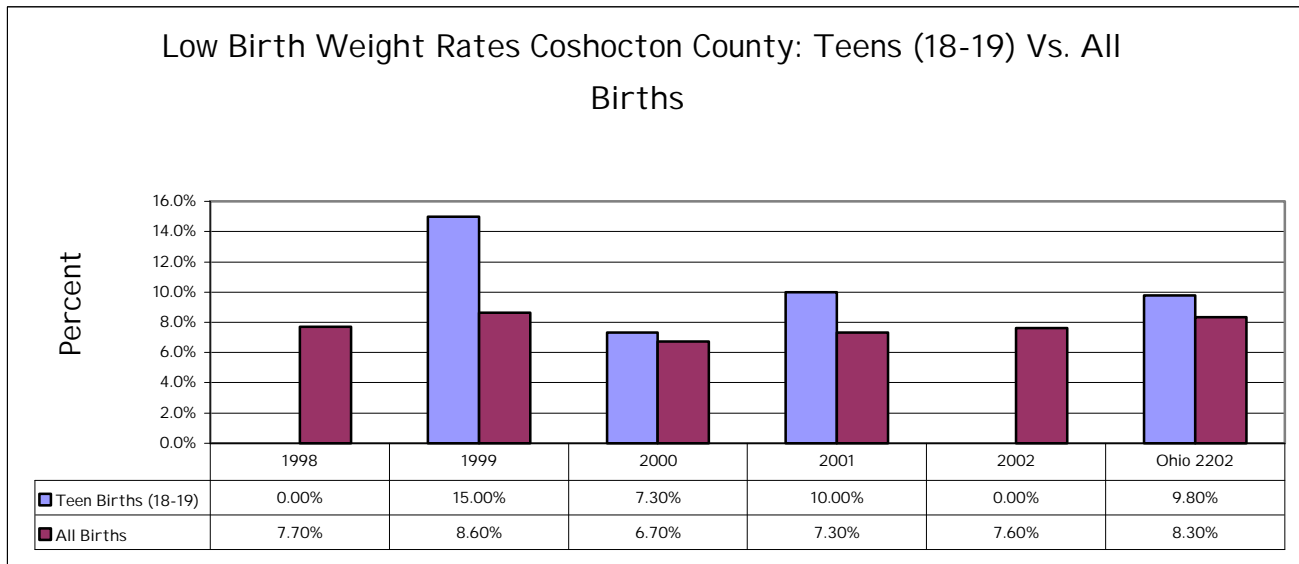

LOW BIRTH WEIGHT BABIES TO TEENS 18-19 VS. ALL BIRTHS

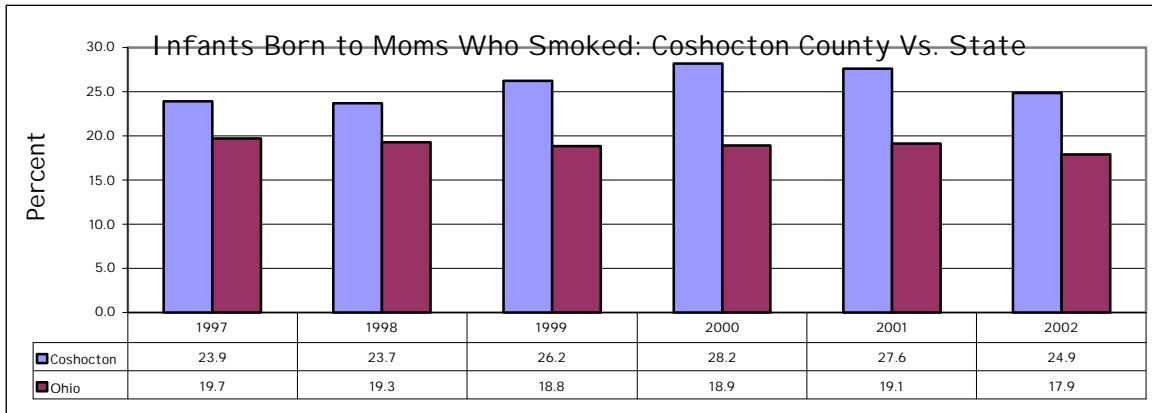

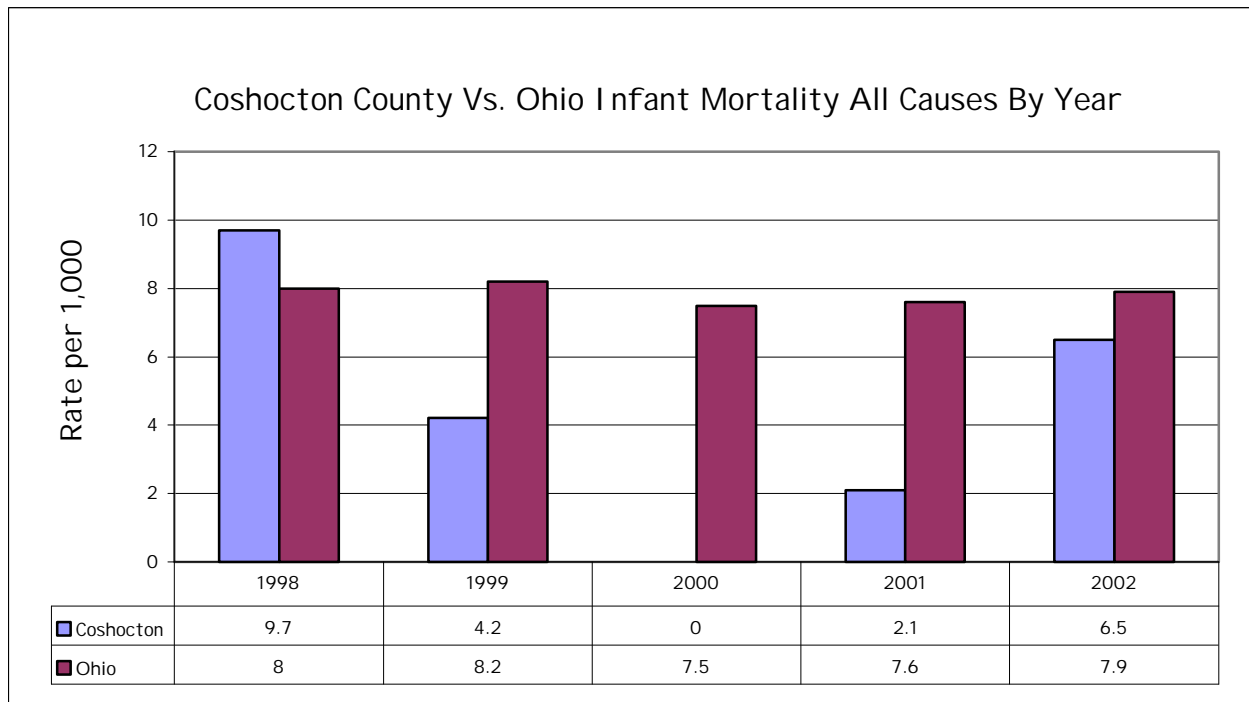
BIRTHS TO MOTHERS WHO SMOKE COSHOCTON VS. OHIO

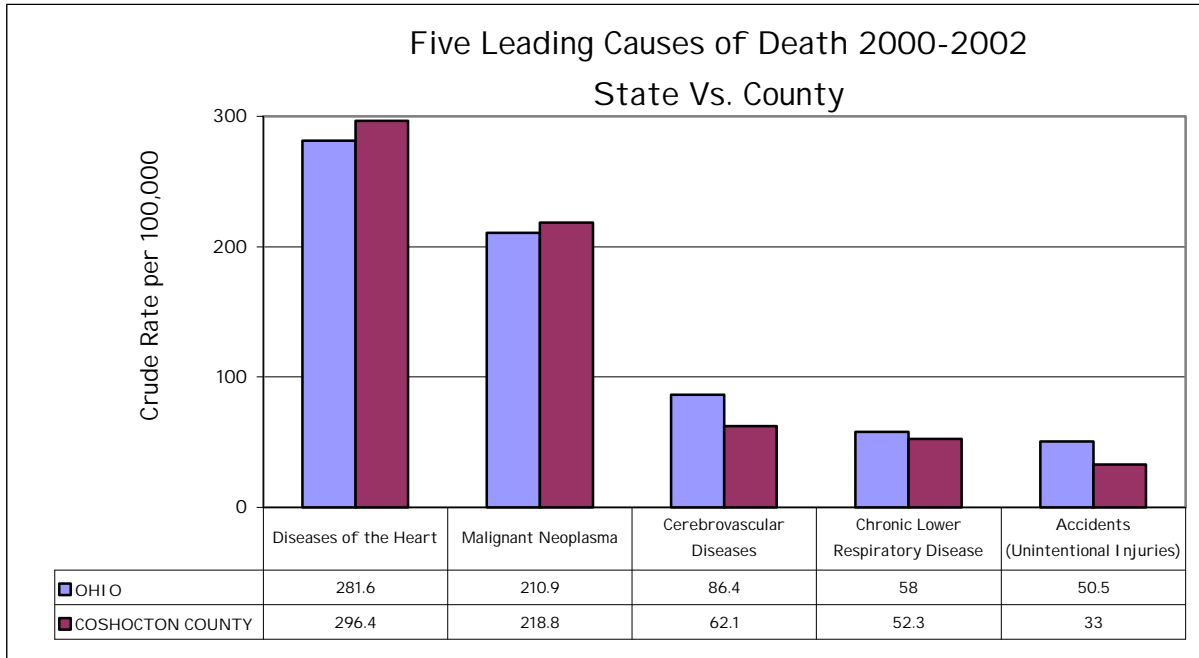

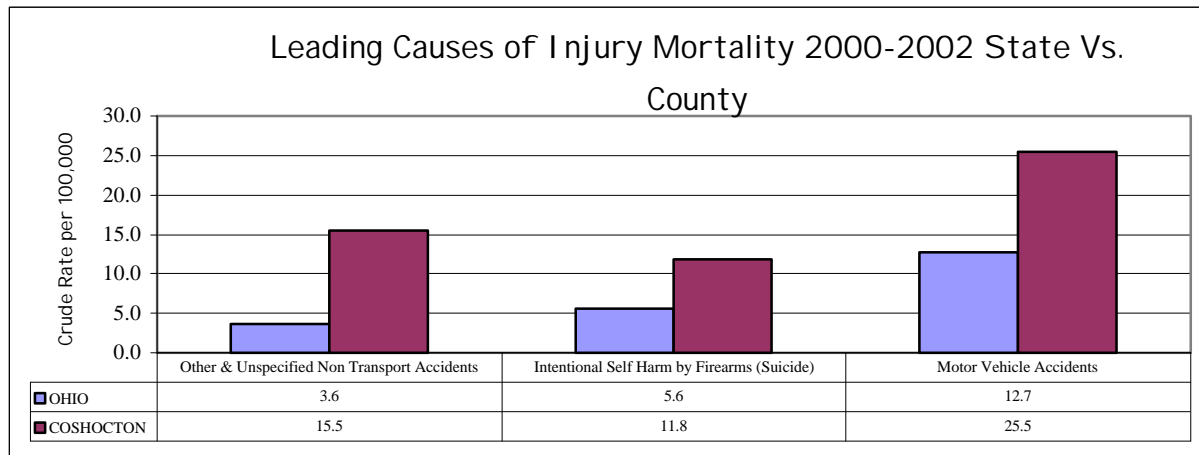

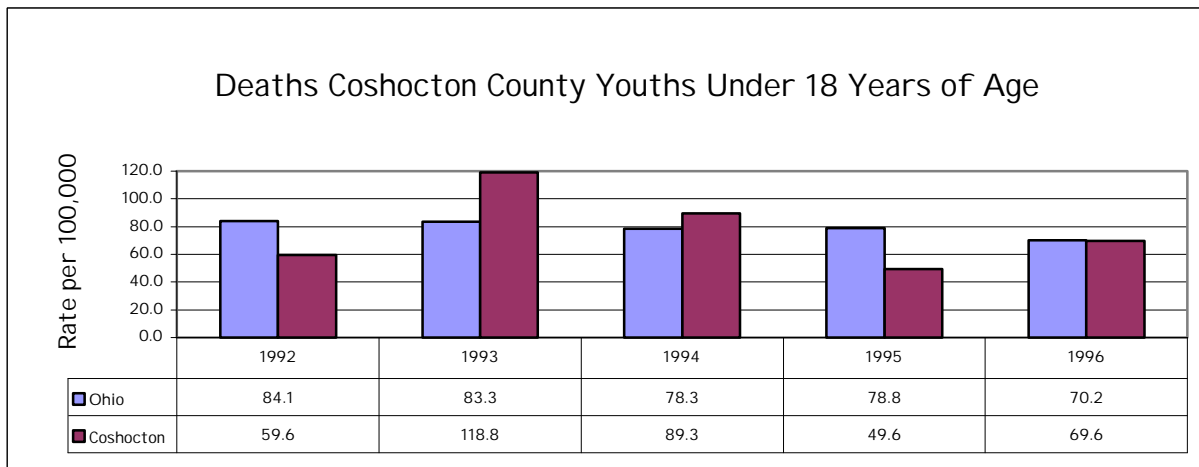
LEADING CAUSES OF SELECTED INJURY MORTALITY

BLOOD LEAD LEVELS

Very severe lead exposure in children (blood lead levels ≥ 80 ug/dL) can cause coma, convulsions and death. Lower levels cause adverse affects on the central nervous system and kidneys. Blood lead levels as low as 10 ug/dL, which do not cause distinctive symptoms, are associated with decreased intelligence and impaired neurobehavioral development. Decreased stature or growth has also been associated with these lower blood lead levels.
