Under the direction of Steve Lonsinger, Health Commissioner, they offer a myriad of health-related services with several funding streams under their umbrella.

HB 34 Allows Delivery of Notices by Ordinary Mail & Email

House Bill 34 was signed by the Governor with a November 2, 2018, effective date. This was one of the pieces of legislature that the County Auditor's Association of Ohio (CAAO) was instrumental in getting written and in its promotion and support throughout the legislative process.

While it changes delivery for several documents in multiple agencies, the County Auditor's Office will see savings in certified mail postage costs in the Board of Revision, Current Agricultural Use Value (CAUV), and Agricultural District programs.

Prior to the passage of this bill, the Ohio Revised Code that governed these programs required multiple pieces of correspondence and documents to be mailed via certified mail. With over thousands of farms participating in CAUV and the Agricultural Districts, and with anywhere from 30 to 300 Board of Revision complaints filed annually, the cost of the extra postage of a little over five dollars per envelope adds up quickly. The bill does away with this requirement, as long as the taxpayer has instigated the process (like applying for a program or filing a complaint). Certified letters are still required if a third party has filed a complaint against a taxpayer's property.

The Department of Tax Equalization is working to update appropriate forms and applications to include an email address. Please take time to share your email address with us. The bill still requires us to notify with BOTH email and regular mail. If we do not have both email and mailing addresses, certified mail is still required.

CAUV and Agricultural District renewal applications will now be accepted via return email as well.

Change Finder New Tool in County Appraiser's Toolbox



County Auditor Chris Sycks contracted for an extra piece of technology with the last Pictometry fly-over done to aid with the 2018 triennial update. This Change Finder software compares the photos done on the 2017 autumn flight with those done in spring of 2014. The changes detected are color-coded – red for a change in a structure, green for a new structure, purple for demolition of a prior structure, and gray for existing structures in both flights. The photo above shows one parcel with all four colors. The 2014 photo is on the left of the split screen, and the 2017 photo is on the right.

With this software, the in-house appraisers can more efficiently plan their new construction routes as well as pick up items that may not have been reported properly. Some appraisal work, like a demolished structure, can also be done at the desktop without an actual visit. We have had the software in place since early September and already more than \$500,000 in market value of structures previously not on record.

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CAAO Legislative Committee Update

As a member of the County Auditors' Association of Ohio (CAAO)'s Legislative Committee, County Auditor Chris Sycks and other members actively participate in legislative activity, including initiating legislative proposals, monitoring bills that may negatively affect local taxpayers and county government, and encouraging policies that positively impact them. If this list is compared with the list in the last issue, it is evident that not much movement has occurred. The legislators are in full campaign season now, so activity is nearly non-existent. A very active lame duck session is expected after the election and before the end of the year. Below are current bills that are of interest to the CAAO.

- HB 3 DataOhio Board Creation. Creates board and catalogs public data online, governs online public records, addresses uniform chart of accounts. Reported out, House Finance Committee.
- HB 34 Official Notice Delivery. To allow certain notifications by other than certified mail. Signed by Governor, effective 11/2/2018.
- HB 49 Operating Budget. SYF 2018-19 main budget, including a multitude of issues affecting local governments.
 Consideration of Governor's Vetoes.
- HB 70 Fuel Tax Transparency. Requires our weights & measures inspectors to place stickers on all pumps itemizing taxes.
 Ist Hearing, House Government Accountability & Oversight Committee.
- HB 102 School Funding Reform. To replace
 local school levies with a statewide
 property tax, repeal school income taxes, require certain tax exemption reimbursements, require the Treasurer of
 State to issue bonds to refund school
 debt, among other items. 2nd Hearing,
 House Finance Committee.
- HB 104 Tax Refund on Bad Debts. Allows vendors to receive sales tax refunds on credit accounts charged off as uncollectible. Ist Hearing, Senate Finance Committee.
- HB 205 Senior Housing Relief. Prohibits tax foreclosures on senior homeowners who have paid current taxes in all but five or fewer tax years. Ist Hearing, House Financial Institutions, Housing & Urban Development.
- HB 295/HB 558 Disabled Veterans Assistance Dogs. Exempts certain disabled veterans from paying a dog registration fee if proof is included that the dog is an assistance dog. 295-2nd Hearing/558 2nd Hearing, House Armed Services, Veteran's Affairs & Homeland Security Comm.
- HB 298 Public Employee Sick Days. Changes the number of sick days provided to public employees. 2nd Hearing, House State & Local Government Committee.
- HB 310 Elected Official Concealed Carry.
 Permitting an elected official to carry a handgun in a government facility if he/she holds a valid license. In House Federalism & Interstate Relations

Manufactured Homes Converted to Real Estate Should No Longer Have Active Titles

If you are paying taxes on a manufactured home on the same bill as your land, you should have no active title for your home.

Certain manufactured homeowners may be eligible to have their home taxed as real estate in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 4505.11. If a manufactured home is titled exactly the same as the land upon which it sits, and if it is permanently attached to the land by means of a basement or additions around it, it can be taxed as real estate and included in your tax bill for your land. In addition, all taxes must be paid and the title of the manufactured home be surrendered and cancelled. More information and the form to convert are located at the link below.

We have identified owners of real estate manufactured homes with active titles and sent out 104 letters explaining the problem. If you received one of these letters, or if you have a title for a manufactured home that has already been converted to real estate, please contact our office by phone at 622-1243 or by email at manufacturedhomes@coshoctoncounty.net to arrange to surrender the title. If the home was converted prior to 2006, and especially in the 1990s, you may want to check into the status of your title as not all titles were surrendered properly prior to that.

Taking care of this now may avoid problems when you are ready to sell your property or need to refinance. More information about manufactured home taxes and conversion to real estate taxes can be viewed at: https://www.coshoctoncounty.net/auditor/manufactured-homes/

UNCLAIMED MONIES!

If a payment is made from county funds to any person or business, and that warrant (check) is not cashed, after a period of time the amount is moved into the "Unclaimed Money Fund" until the owner claims it. Likewise, if a property undergoes a tax foreclosure and the auction brings more than the amount owed for taxes and court cost, the excess goes into the "Unclaimed Foreclosure Fund" until the owner claims it. After three years, the money is forfeited and cannot be claimed. We currently have unclaimed cash balances totaling \$98,632 between these two funds. The process and forms used to claim the money are available by contacting our office at 740-622-1243. Below is a partial listing of recent additions for each.

Auditor's Sale to be Held on October 19th

"Every tract of land foreclosed upon for delinquent taxes or a tax lien that has been properly offered for sale on two separate occasions, not less than two weeks apart and not sold shall be forfeited to the state and the County Auditor will offer it for sale to the highest bidder." Ohio Revised Code Section 5723

An Auditor's Sale has been scheduled for 10:30 a.m. on Friday, October 19th, and will be held on the main floor of the Courthouse immediately following any scheduled Sheriff's Sales. Required legal notices will be published on October 5th and October 12th. Beginning October 6th, pre-registration will be available online at https://www.coshoctoncounty.net/auditor/auditor-sale/

All parcels are first offered for the lesser of the Auditor's Fair Market Value or the total of all costs, taxes and charges. If any of the parcels fail to sell at this minimum bid, they are immediately offered again in a second sale for the best possible bid. During the May auction, eighteen items were sold for a high bid of \$1 each.

No person delinquent on real property taxes in the State of Ohio may purchase a property at an Auditor's Sale. In addition, the owner of record or a member of his or her immediate family prior to the judgment of foreclosure or forfeiture may not purchase the property for less than the total amount of taxes, assessments, penalties, interest and costs. ORC 5723.06(3)(b) defines immediate family as a spouse who resides in the same household and children, regardless of where they live.

Any taxes, charges or costs not covered by the sale will be remitted and all liens are eliminated except for the real estate taxes covered by the sale. If there is a Federal lien, the Federal Government has "Right of Redemption" and may take the property for one year after the original foreclosure was filed. The buyer will receive only the amount he paid at the Auditor's sale and no more regardless of improvements done after the purchase.

BOARD OF REVISION UPDATES

Ohio Revised Code Section 5715.02 establishes the Board of Revision (BOR) for the taxpayer to have process to challenge the value set on his or her property for tax purposes. The Board consists of the county treasurer, the auditor, and one commissioner. Taxpayers are able to appeal the BOR's decision at the Common Pleas Court (CPC) or Ohio Board of Tax Appeals (BTA). Since the BOR has no additional evidence nor plan on hiring an attorney to argue the case, it was their decision to waive appearance on all cases and allow the judge or the BTA to determine based on evidence and argument included in the BOR case file and transcript. Following are the open appeals.

More Efficient County Recycling

Funding for a new 20-yard rear-load packer truck and 30 new 6-yard containers for the County drop-off recycling sites was granted through the 2018 Coshocton Fairfield Licking Perry (CFLP) Solid Waste District Recycling Grant. The new bins have been installed at our twelve County drop-off recycling sites and are proving to be easier and more efficient for recycling. The new packer truck allows for the County Recycling Coordinator, Tim Beck, to empty containers at more sites per day, allowing for

more recycling to be collected countywide. The packer truck is more efficient as fewer trips to the recycling collection facility are necessary. The previous method was to pull individual site containers one at a time to the recycling facility.

At least two containers have been placed at each site. One container will be labeled "Cardboard Only" and has a slot in the side to place flattened cardboard boxes. The other container will be for "Comingled (mixed) Recyclables" and will be for all other recyclables: paper, plastic, steel and aluminum cans. No need to separate! We do ask that **no** plastic bags, food-contaminated items or trash be placed with the recycling. Cleaner recycling results in items being readily recycled instead of being a contaminant and becoming trash. All recyclables must be placed inside the container. If the container is full or nearly full, please contact our office.
