ORC 3701-29-19

In 2015, the Ohio Department of Health adopted rules setting up the regulation for local health districts to administer and develop an operation and maintenance sewage system program. These new rules mandated that ALL health districts develop and implement a local Operation and Maintenance program to ensure all systems in their jurisdiction are evaluated for regular maintenance and proper function.

- No additional funding provided by ODH



ORC 3701-29-19

(STS operation and maintenance management, and system owner education)

Phase in PLAN for <u>Management Program</u> for all Prior installed Sewage Systems that have not received and Operation Permit.

Years 1-5 (Phasing-In)

Initial Assessment

Assessments will be inventoried into a STS data base with the Address, Location, and Type of System

Operation permit fee with a new installation - \$50.00

Renewal of Operation Permit after 5 years - \$25.00

Permit General Provisions:

- * Maintain their systems so that a public health hazard is not created
- * Each owner shall renew in the 5 year period (receive renewal in mail)
- * Permits will be transferable upon the sale of a home
- * Provide Proof of maintenance within that 5 year period (service provider inspections, & pumping records)
- * Service Contracts Will be required for any system with electrical components EX. UV, Aeration, or discharging permits (registered service provider)
- * Homeowners with GRAVITY fed systems will not be required to have a service contract.



Will I have to upgrade my system with this permit? NO - If its not creating a nuisance, there's no need to fix it.

Why is this important?

Taking care of your system will increase the longevity and life of the system. Maintenance and up keep is important in the long run. Costs can reach up to \$15,000 for a new system installation.

Our 2024 Annual Report provides an overview of the work our dedicated staff accomplishes to promote, prevent, and protect the health of our communities.

The Coshocton Public Health District is completing its second year since combining city and county departments into one. We strive to provide excellent services to our residents and grow to meet community needs. For Coshocton County's future of public health, we have focused on data to drive our programming. Coshocton Public Health District enjoys providing community outreach at events and health fairs throughout the county and the monthly Coffee with a Doc program, sharing health and safety tips through social media and other media, providing care during 1,541 patient visits to our clinic, investigating 984 communicable diseases, serving 2,795 WIC participants, investigating nuisance complaints, inspecting 213 licensed food facilities, providing birth and death certificates to the community and working tirelessly on national accreditation which the State of Ohio requires.

We head into 2025 focused on continuous improvement. CPHD continues to seek alternate funding sources to enhance and strengthen our programming. 



PUBLIC HEALTH ACCREDITATION

How it works:


The Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) is the national organization that conducts accreditation. Applicants must demonstrate that they meet the standards for the 10 Essential Public Health Services. A peer review team assesses the application, including an in-person site visit. The PHAB Accreditation Committee decides whether to accredit the applicant. Accredited departments are accredited for five years. To maintain accreditation, departments must apply for reaccreditation when their initial accreditation expires.

Accreditation is mandated for Public Health Departments in the State of Ohio.

Benefits of accreditation:

Accreditation demonstrates that health departments meet national standards. It shows that departments have the capacity to provide core public health services. It supports the goals of improved quality, accountability, and credibility.



ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

What is a Public Health Nuisance?

The enforcement ability of Public Health is limited to conditions which threaten the public health. A condition may certainly be a nuisance to you, but it may not be a public health nuisance.

Examples of a Public Health Nuisance Include:

Garbage piled outside ● Stagnant water in a swimming pool ● Rodent and pest infestation ● Sewage failures ● Restaurant facility complaints
 ● Open burning/open dumping.

Top 3 Nuisance Complaints for 2024:

- Trash
- Sewage
- Roach/Bedbugs

Examples of Nuisances NOT Under Public Health Authority:

Mold ● Unsecured structures ● Bedbugs ● Tall grass/weeds ● Junk



Home Sewage Treatment System Assistance Projects

During 2024 there were 5 individual households that were able to qualify for the Ohio EPA HSTS assistance program. Approximately \$70,000 in funds were used to replace and repair the failing septic systems in Coshocton County.

The Ohio Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program provides public health lead investigations, case management, education, and lead data.

Lead can damage nearly every system in the human body, and has harmful effects on both adults and children. It is a serious environmental public health threat to children in Ohio.

OHHLPPP addresses the needs of lead-poisoned children from birth to age 6. The program assists family members, medical care providers and other community members to reduce and prevent lead poisoning.







