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# **Executive Summary**

This plan is the Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan for Coshocton County, Ohio. The plan was initially developed in 2008, rewritten in 2016 and is updated. This plan fulfills the requirements of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, signed into law as a reauthorization of surface transportation programs through Fiscal Year 2020. According to requirements of the FAST Act, locally developed coordinated public transit-human services transportation plans must be updated to reflect the changes established by the FAST Act legislation. The FAST Act applies new programs and rules for all Fiscal Year 2016 funds and authorizes transit programs for five (5) years.

Transportation is a critical component of the communities in Coshocton County, Ohio. Transportation provides access to jobs, education, health care, human services and allows all community members, including older adults and people with disabilities, to live independently and engage in community life. It is the purpose of this plan for local stakeholders to work collaboratively to do the following activities:

Using the transportation plan as a guide, the Mobility Manager will collaborate with local and regional providers, stakeholders, public/government officials, The Transportation Advisory Board, peer groups and the public to continually work towards meeting the goals established within the plan. At minimum, quarterly meetings will be held with the Transportation Advisory Board to discuss progress, strategies and issues in achieving said goals. The Mobility Manager will participate in regional efforts under the direction of OMEGA keeping Coshocton County an active participant in regional transportation efforts. Plan participants will be kept abreast of current and developing transportation needs and will work collaboratively on goals and strategies to address these issues.

Fundamental to the Coordinated Transportation Plan process is the active and meaningful involvement of stakeholders. For projects selected for funding under the Section 5310 program, participation in planning activities must include participation and/or representation of the following, at minimum:

- Seniors;
- Individuals with disabilities;
- People with low incomes;
- Public, private and non-profit transportation providers;
- Human services providers, and;
- The general public.
- Veterans

#### I. Geographic Area

**Coshocton County** 

Coshocton County is a rural Appalachian county with an estimated population of 36,901 in 2010 (US Census). Located in east-central Ohio, the county comprises 563.91 square miles, divided into 22 townships.

As of the 2010 United States Census, there were 14,658 households, and 10,089 families living in the county. The population density was 65.4 inhabitants per square mile (25.3/km²). There were 16,545 housing units at an average density of 29.3 per square mile (11.3/km²). The racial makeup of the county was 97.0% white, 1.1% black or African American, 0.3% Asian, 0.2% American Indian, 0.2% from other races, and 1.2% from 2 or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latino origin made up 0.8% of the population. In terms of ancestry, 29.5% were German, 14.2% were Irish, 11.2% were English, and 10.3% were American.

Of the 14,658 households, 30.8% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 53.7% were married couples living together, 10.4% had a female householder with no husband present, 31.2% were non-families, and 26.3% of all households were made up of individuals. The average household size was 2.49 and the average family size was 2.98. The median age was 40.8 years.


The median income for a household in the county was \$39,469 and the median income for a family was \$47,931. Males had a median income of \$39,701 versus \$26,706 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$19,635. About 12.4% of families and 17.0% of the population were below the poverty line, including 26.0% of those under age 18 and 8.3% of those age 65 or over.

Coshocton's prominence was established early as an important port (Roscoe) along the Ohio-Erie Canal, which helped to open commerce from the East Coast to central and southern Ohio. Later, a mainline of the Pennsylvania Railroad was built through Coshocton County, ensuring fast and convenient transportation for the county's industry and residents. The county's economy flourished with the development of U.S. Hwy 36 as a four-lane connection to the federal interstate system, as well as development of Ohio Route 16 as a direct route to the state capital – much of which includes limited access, four-lane highway. Coshocton County shares a border with Holmes County, home to the largest Amish community in the United States. A significant number of Amish reside in the northern and western sectors of Coshocton County.


However, as is true of many rural counties in Ohio, even with its sound transportation connectivity Coshocton began to experience a severe economic downturn in 1990. Six major employers have closed or drastically downsized, idling thousands of workers. Most recently, 165 jobs were lost with the closing of AEP as well as an additional 35 ancillary jobs.

In 2020, ODOT designated Coshocton County Coordinated Transportation Agency (CCCTA) a 5311 Rural Public Transit Program. CCCTA is the first recipient of such funding in Coshocton County.

#### II. Population Demographics

Per the 2010 US Census, there were 36,901 people, 14,658 households, and 10,089 families residing in the county. The Census showed a white population of 35,450, a black or African American population of 440, an American Indian and Alaska native population of 108, and Asian population of 130, a native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander population of 8, and a population of individuals who identify as two or more races of 466.

Of the 36,901 people living in Coshocton County, the Census estimates that 5,012 individuals are living with a disability. That is an estimated percentage of 13.8% of the total population.

The Census shows an estimated 17% of all individuals living in Coshocton County as being below the defined poverty level. This equates to an estimated 5,058 total individuals. It is estimated that 1,085 individuals are unemployed. Per the Census, of the 28,538 individuals over the age of 16 in Coshocton County, 10,908 worked full-time, year-round in the past 12 months. 6,829 individuals worked part-time, or part-year in the past 12 months. 10,801 individuals show having not worked at all in the last 12 months.

The median age in Coshocton County is 40.8 years of age. An estimated 8,879 individuals are 18 years of age or younger. 22,030 individuals are age 18 to 64. 5,992 individuals are 65 years and over, and 768 are 85 years of age and over.



An estimated 3.7% or 1,285 Coshocton County residents 5 years and over speak English less than "very well". An estimated 9% or 3,103 county residents 5 years and older speak a language other than English. The determination is that this is a "small LEP population".

#### III. Assessment of Available Services

Conducting an evaluation of service provider capabilities and analyzing the existing gaps and duplications of services for transportation resources in each community, provides transportation planners with the information needed to implement changes that will improve the network of transportation resources and services in Coshocton County and across county lines.

#### Assessment of Community Support for Transit

Public transportation is a great asset to many living in Coshocton County. Public and provider survey results continue to show a need for expanded transportation services. Community Support for transit is strongest from the agencies that serve county residents in need of transportation services. Most of these agencies sit on the Transportation Advisory Board and participated in the initial development of The Coshocton County Locally Developed Transportation Plan in 2008.

Transit is greatly supported by The Coshocton County Board of Commissioners. The Board of Commissioners provide office space, utilities and internet service to CCCTA and the Mobility Manager at no charge. A Commissioner also sits on the Transportation Advisory Board. Additionally, The United Way, Coshocton Foundation, Coshocton County Board of DD, Coshocton Veterans Service, Coshocton County Dept. of Job & family Services and other local social service agencies in the county support transit and Mobility Management with funding to assist with vehicle & software purchases and grant match money.

#### Safety

CCCTA strictly follows all safety recommendations and standards set forth by all of our funding sources and partnering agencies. These policies include, but are not limited to, standards set by ODOT, the Ohio Revised Code, the Area Agency on Aging, the Coshocton County Policy handbook, etc. To date, CCCTA has been found in compliance for all safety precautions and procedures.

The Mobility Manager has been in discussion with the Coshocton County Emergency Management Agency about entering CCCTA into the County's Emergency Preparedness Plan and participates in the Coshocton County Healthcare Coalition. The MM developed a Health, Safety and Emergency Preparedness Plan for providers in Coshocton County. The plan in under review and pending adoption.

#### **Vehicles**

Survey/Interview participants listed a combined total of 48 vehicles. Approximately 77% of the vehicles are wheelchair accessible. A vehicle utilization table is provided at the end of this chapter (Table 6).

All of the transportation providers except the Coshocton County Veterans Service & Crow Town Taxi provide at least 1 wheelchair accessible vehicle, while some organizations have an entire fleet of wheelchair accessible vehicles. The Coshocton County Veterans Service collaborates with CCCTA to provide wheelchair accessible transportation to Veterans when needed.

Wheelchair vehicles are in high demand in Coshocton County. With the vehicles limited to the amount of wheelchairs they can transport at once, it makes it more difficult to coordinate rides for multiple individuals going to the same destination. This also affects our ambulatory clients. The more clients there are in the shuttle that are in a wheelchair, the less ambulatory clients we can accommodate.

As vehicles age, they require additional maintenance, may break down more often, and become costlier to operate. Vehicle replacement, based on age and condition, is vital to the overall cost effectiveness of the transportation services provided.

# Summary of Existing Resources

The vehicle utilization charts above show 9 providers have a combined total of 48 vehicles available to transport Coshocton County residents. Of the 77 vehicles inventoried, 37 or 77% are wheelchair accessible.

The existing community resources can be broken down into six categories:

- A. Cab Companies (Crow Town Taxi)
- B. Senior transportation (Coshocton Senior Center)
- C. Veterans transportation (Coshocton County Veterans Service/CCCTA)
- D. Transportation for Developmentally Disabled (Midwest, RHDD & The Fuse Network (HWI)
- E. Public Transportation (CCCTA)
- F. Medical transportation (MVHC & CCEMS)

## IV. Assessment of Transportation Needs and Gaps

In an effort to better understand the Coshocton County needs, the planning committee examined research and data, as well as solicited input from the community in an effort to gather information about needs and gaps in transportation services.

The demographic and socio-economic conditions of the study area are discussed in the Demographics Chapter of this plan. The following overview is an evaluation of the gaps in service based upon geographic data as well as from the perspective of the targeted populations, transportation providers, and the general public.

The Coshocton County Mobility Manager along with a variety of stakeholders in the area in an attempt to solicit input and request participation from any organization that could potentially be impacted by the coordinated transportation planning process. More information on how the lead agency engaged stakeholder and the general public is available upon request.

The following methods were used to assess transportation needs and gaps

- Assessment of data and demographics
- Transportation Advisory Board Meetings
- Coordination with other agencies that are performing surveys or data for planning
- Regional collaboration with/through OMEGA
- Client, public & provider surveys
- Focus groups
- Public meetings

## Local Demographic and Socio-Economic Data

Data for each target population group were aggregated by Census Block Group for transportation analysis. The demographic and socio-economic data is valuable because a comparison of where the highest and lowest densities individuals who are most likely to need transportation live. This information can then be compared to the locations of (1) major trip generators, and (2) available transportation services.

The following exhibit 1 illustrates the areas where the number of older adults (age 65 and older) is at or above the Coshocton County average.





Exhibit 1: Map of Population Density of Individuals Age 65 and Older



#### Analysis of Demographic Data

The 2016 Coshocton County Community Needs Assessment shows of Coshocton County's 36,901 residents, approximately 14.7 % of them have some form of disability, 18.1% of them are below the national poverty level, 16.2% of them are 65 years of age or older. Means of transportation to work in Coshocton county shows 79.7% of the population drove themselves alone, 103% carpooled, 4.7% worked at home, 2.7% walked, 2.1% used taxis, motorcycles or bicycles and .4% use public transportation.

# General Public and Stakeholder Meetings/Focus Groups

The Coshocton County Mobility Manager hosted and facilitated 7 local meetings and focus groups to discuss the unmet transportation needs and gaps in mobility and transportation. 94 people participated in the meetings. Of those, 52 self-identified as older adults and 10 self-identified as being a person with a disability. More information about what meetings were held and attendance at those meetings is available upon request.

During the meeting, the Mobility Manager presented highlights of historical coordinated transportation in the Coshocton County, and discussed the activities since the last Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan that have helped to address some of the unmet transportation needs and gaps in services for the area.

Following the initial presentation, the stakeholders were asked to review the gaps in transportation services and needs from the previous plan/or update and identify any gaps that were no longer valid and any new needs/gaps, which the facilitator deleted/added to/from a list. The focus of the discussion was transportation for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and people with low incomes. However, several topics discussed also impact mobility options for the general public.

After the changes to the needs/gaps list were completed and new needs/gaps were added, each participant was asked to rank the needs/gaps using colored dots representing a high, medium, or low priority or that the remaining gap/need should be deleted.

Participants discussed more than 10 mobility issues to achieve, preserve, avoid, or eliminate through coordination during the meetings. Coordinated transportation stakeholders will consider these unmet needs when developing transportation goals and strategies, and grant applications. The exhibit at the end of this section provides a summary of the unmet mobility needs discussed during the meeting as well as the needs identified by the survey results.

# Surveys

The following survey summary includes the information gained from the following surveys that were performed. 143 surveys from the general public: 11 % of individuals with disabilities completed the survey; 34% of older adults (65+) completed the survey.

- Turfism

# V. Goals and Strategies

## Developing Strategies to Address Gaps and Needs

Strategies for improving transportation for the Coshocton County should address the service gaps and user needs identified in this plan, if they are to be effective. As described, the gaps and unmet needs were based on information obtained from geographic analysis, the attendees participating in the meetings, and responses to the public survey.

Based on information gathered throughout the planning process, the Coshocton County Mobility Management developed the following strategies to address the gaps and unmet transportation needs. Priority levels are assigned by considering the primary funding sources that could be available to support plan implementation compared to the importance of meeting this unmet need expressed by the public and stakeholders. Not all strategies are activities specifically eligible for funding under the existing programs, nor is it guaranteed that sufficient funding will be available to achieve every strategy identified. In addition, the local stakeholders will need to provide support and commit to pursuing the strategies if they are to be accomplished. Nonetheless, these strategies have been tailored to 3 of the identified primary gaps and needs.

Below is an outline describing the prioritized strategies to address each of the identified unmet transportation needs and gaps in service.

#### Goal #1: Expansion of transportation services in Coshocton County

**Need(s) Being Addressed:** Coshocton County residents are in need of transportation for non-medical purposes such as employment, special events and after school needs for school age children.

<u>Strategy 1.1:</u> Develop affordable and dependable transportation programs for non-medical needs. <u>Timeline for Implementation:</u> 1 to 2 years

# VI. Plan Adoption

The ODOT Office of Transit requires that all locally adopted coordinated public transit human services transportation plans be developed according to a stated planning process. The first version of The Locally Developed Transportation Plan for Coshocton County, Ohio was developed internally and adopted in October of 2008. The plan was rewritten and adopted in February 2016 and updated annually. The 2020 rewrite was developed internally and adopted by the Coshocton County Commissioners on November 18, 2020. The annual updates and development going forward is as follows:

- The Mobility Manager will facilitate public meetings, focus groups and quarterly (at minimum) stakeholder meetings.
- The Mobility manager will conduct a public survey and handout surveys at all meetings and public functions
- A survey will be made available on the Mobility Manager's website and promoted through local media sources
- Surveys will be made available to transit riders
- All information collected will be presented to the Transportation Advisory Board/Planning Committee at the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter board meeting
- The Mobility Manager will document all progress on goals/strategies throughout the year and present them to the Transportation Advisory Board/Planning Committee
- All gaps/needs will be ranked for the plan
- The Transportation Advisory Board/Planning Committee will discuss any changes and determine if the plan needs updated
- Changes will follow the amendment process
- Once all changes have been implemented, the plan will be sent to the Transportation Advisory Board/Planning Committee for review seven days prior to the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter board meeting. The proposed updated plan will also be available for review on the Mobility Management web site for public review/comments and an ad will be placed in The Coshocton Beacon notifying the public the plan is available.
- The Transportation Advisory Board/Planning Committee will hold a 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter meeting to adopt the coordinated plan by majority vote.
- The coordinated plan will then be sent to the Coshocton County Board of Commissioners for adoption.

# Appendix C: Definitions

There are several terms used throughout the plan that may be unique to transportation providers or human service agencies. The terms are defined here for reference.

**Coordination** – Collaborative efforts toward understanding and meeting the mobility needs in the most appropriate, cost effective, and responsive manner.

**FAST Act** – Congress established the funding for Federal Transit Administration programs through authorizing legislation that amends Chapter 53 of Title 49 of the U.S. Code. On December 4, 2015, President Obama signed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, reauthorizing surface transportation programs through Fiscal Year 2020.

**Gaps in Service** – A break in the continuity of available transportation resources such as a break between hours of operation or a break between two or more geographic areas.

Lead Agency – The organization responsible for facilitating outreach; composing a plan that meets the requirements of current Federal and State legislation; maintaining documentation from the planning process and making it available upon request; and leading stakeholders through annual reviews, amendments, and updates of the plan. The Lead Agency also is responsible for submitting the adopted Coordinated Plan and all amendments or updates to participating stakeholders and ODOT.

**Planning Committee** – (indicate if the planning committee has another formal name) The Planning Committee is composed of key community stakeholders. The Planning Committee members agree to actively participate in the planning process and act as the plan advisory and adopting entity.

**Ridership** – The total number of passengers who boarded transportation vehicles are counted each time they board a vehicle.

**Section 5310 Program** – Enhanced Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities (49 U.S.C. 5310) provides Federal formula funding for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs. The program aims to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options.

**Section 5311 Program** – The Formula Grants for Rural Areas program provides capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations. The program also provides funding for state and national training and technical assistance through the Rural Transportation Assistance Program. Subrecipients may include state or local government authorities, nonprofit organizations, and operators of public transportation or intercity bus service.

**Section 5307 Program** – The Urbanized Area Formula Grants program (49 U.S.C. 5307) makes federal resources available to urbanized areas and to governors for transit capital and operating assistance in


urbanized areas and for transportation-related planning. An urbanized area is an incorporated area with a population of 50,000 or more.

**Transportation** – Transportation is broadly defined to include traditional transit, human service agency services, on-demand (taxi-like) services, bicycle and pedestrian programs and amenities.

**Unmet Transportation Needs** – Transportation that is wanted or desired but is not currently available.
