In Memoriam



Judge C. Fenning Pierce

On December 1, 2025, the Court was saddened to learn of the death of former Coshocton County Juvenile and Probate Court Judge C. Fenning Pierce. Judge Pierce led the Court from 1981 until his retirement in 2009. In his 28 years on the bench, Judge Pierce innovated the Court in countless ways. He oversaw the establishment of the Juvenile Diversion program, as well as the Court's first Specialized Docket, in its Juvenile Drug Court, which has evolved into the current Family Dependency Treatment Court. Judge Pierce also initiated the Court's mediation program and oversaw the Court's move from the Coshocton County Court House to its current location at 426 Main Street, Coshocton Ohio, in 2002.

Along with technical and judicial improvements, Judge Pierce, most importantly, instilled in the Court an emphasis on service to the community and treating the citizens that come before the Court with dignity and a sense of mercy and fairness. These guiding principles remain ingrained with the Court due to Judge Pierce's leadership and are a wonderful reminder of the legacy of his time on the bench.

Judge Pierce will be missed by the staff here at the Court, by the local bar and by the Coshocton community as a whole. Judge Pierce is survived by his wife Carol, their three daughters and five grandchildren. Judge Pierce was a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University, he received his Juris Doctorate from the Vanderbilt University School of Law and was the 2013 recipient of the Coshoctonian Award, along with numerous other accolades.

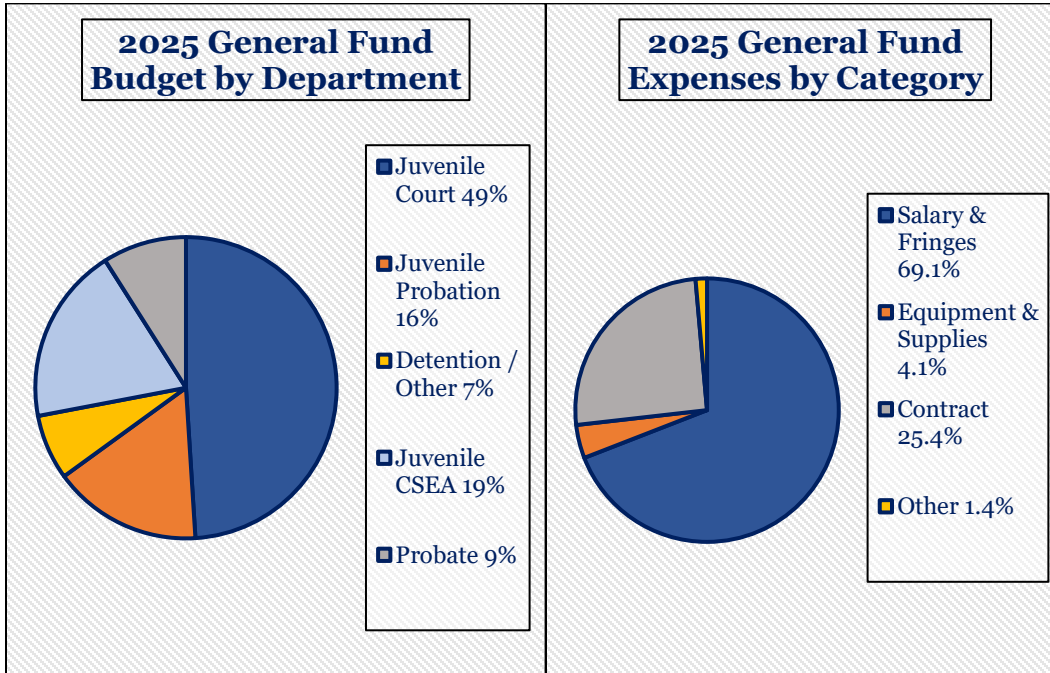
Court Security Station

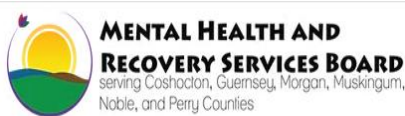
The Coshocton County Family Law Clinic is hosted monthly by Court Partners and serves individuals with limited income by providing access to attorneys for brief advice related to civil filings. Cases including custody, divorce, visitation and other issues related to the General and Juvenile Domestic Dockets are served. Legal Aid of Southeast and Central Ohio screens clients and assists local attorneys to provide this service. Ten area attorneys served 12 clinics and 48 clients of those screened in 2024 receiving assistance at the Juvenile Court Help Center.

Youth and Family Services

Collaboration, community partnerships and evidence-based programming to assist with competency development and restoration lend to better outcomes for families. Below are some areas in which the Court provides services:

Coshocton Resource Center: A community-based collaborative that works with at-risk youth and families to provide meaningful intervention before formal systems involvement. The center is located on the Coshocton Regional Medical Center Campus.

Funding: Operational Funding for 2024 was received from the Ohio Department of Youth Services, Competitive Grant and Reclaim Ohio Funds. Facility Funding was generously provided by Muskingum Area Mental Health Board and Summer Program Funds from the Coshocton Foundation. Funding supports staff salary, rent, equipment, training, food, and other maintenance costs.



Youth and Family Services

Nurturing Parent Program: Contract providers Ohio State University Extension and Coshocton Behavioral Health Choices conduct parent and youth educational sessions utilizing Nurturing Parent Curriculum. Pre- and Post-Evaluation testing is conducted. 41 youth and parents completed classes in State Fiscal Year 2025.



Sexting Intervention Program: First Step FVIS provide individualized sessions to youth involved with sexting and inappropriate texting. Education is adapted from Netsmartz and the Natl. Center for Missing and Exploited Children.
Risks of Vaping: CBHC presents information adapted from Stanford University regarding education, health risks, and the impact on brain development associated with vaping & illicit and unregulated substance use.

Allwell Residential Program: Funding for placement into residential treatment at Allwell Residential Facility and for clothing and hygiene items for youth in placement.
Diversion: Funding used for OJJDP Research based Diversion program, includes staff salary, incentives for youth, and program maintenance costs to operate a delinquency diversion program. Also conducts Grades 7-12 truancy intervention meetings with County School Systems.
Administration: Funding categories include: Family & Children First Council membership, Staff Training, Cell Phones, Local Trauma Informed and Collaboration Training.
Pooled Funding: Funding utilized for cross-systems (shared) youth residential and foster-care placement costs.

Support Activities

Clinical Assessment: Assessments for specialized sex offender treatment and treatment program updates, competency, amenability, competency restoration services for youth. Providers include Allwell BHS, Ohio Family Counselling & Consultation, Forensic Diagnostic, Forum Ohio, and Muskingum County Juvenile Detention.
Community Accountability Program: Funding allows for community service work for restitution payments.
Coshocton County Alternative School: Funding provides for probation and at-risk youth attendance at the County Alternative School in lieu of suspension or expulsion.
Truancy Intervention Program: Funding used for staff member to conduct Kindergarten through Grade 6 truancy intervention meetings at County School Systems. Helps direct families and youth to services within the community. Also provides for program maintenance costs.
Traffic Safety Seminar: Traffic Safety and education provided by Jill Hammersley and the Ohio State Patrol.
Transportation: Funding provided by the State to replace a vehicle used for transporting youth to programs.
Fill The Backpack: A partnership with Coshocton Regional Medical Center to provide backpacks and supplies for all county elementary age school children.



Coshocton Regional Medical Center

Youth and Family Services

Probation Services: Staff for formal delinquency probation, including misdemeanor and felony probation services.

Family Dependency Treatment Court: Specialized Docket Program, 23 clients served in 2025 with 7 successful discharges and 6 neutral or incomplete discharges. 10 clients continued treatment services into 2026. Ohio Department of Behavioral Health funding supports salary, drug testing, and case management. Friends of the Coshocton County Drug Court and By the Dawn's Early Light support client incentives and graduation. The program is certified as an Ohio Specialized Docket that operates using national best practice standards.

Family Services Specialist: Connects families with services and reviews compliance on the civil docket.

Court Investigator: Limited investigative duties on the Civil Docket.

Special Initiatives

Dual Status Youth Project: Judge Jason W. Given convened a series of meetings facilitated by John A. Tuell of the RFK National Resource Center for Juvenile Justice with support from the Supreme Court of Ohio and Ohio Department of Children & Families regarding Dual Status Youth in Coshocton County.

Executive level agency and subject matter experts from community stakeholders that work with the juvenile court and child welfare systems met to review work from across the country & Ohio related to dual status youth, while considering a pathway and services for the target population and families to avoid formal adjudication with sustainable positive outcomes.

Data, Legal and Resource workgroups propose to target both Dually Identified and Dually Involved youth for this project with a 5-year lookback for child welfare involvement. We envision a multi-disciplinary approach to provide services to families in a consistent and timely manner that fits within a prescribed legal framework. Recommendations and guidance for positive youth achievement & desirable systematic outcomes which can be measured is the long-term goal for our community to document program performance.



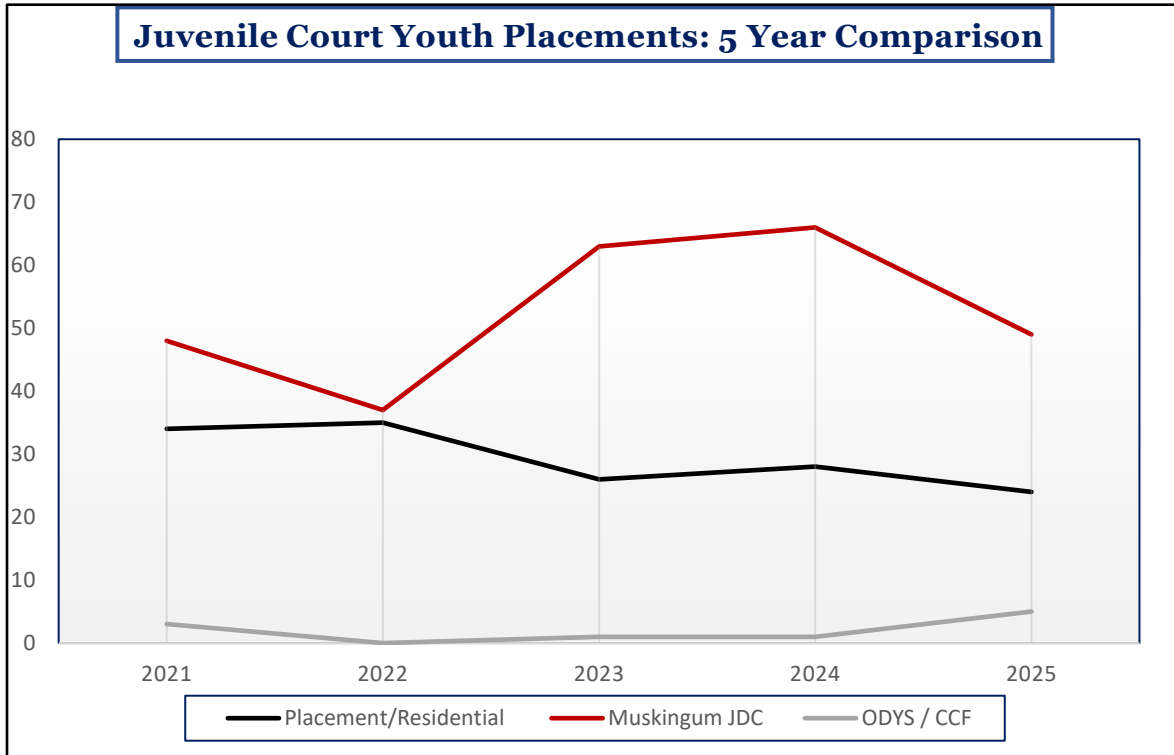

PROBATE GUARDIANSHIP CASES:

- Guardians in Coshocton County are not exempt from State Training Requirements. The Court has hosted trainings to eliminate travel, provides training on flash drives, and directs individuals to free online training.
- Approximately 187 cases remain open for ongoing assistance to those that need ongoing supportive services.
