Tips 1	for a d	cleaner	recycling	stream:
--------	---------	---------	-----------	---------

- Paper, cardboard, plastic or aluminum foil soiled with food is not recyclable.
- Pack loose paper, envelopes, etc. in a brown paper bag to recycle instead of plastic grocery bags.
- Plastic grocery bags, bread bags, dry cleaning bags, etc. can be recycled with your plastic grocery bags at participating local stores.

Did You Ever Wonder...

Why aren't there National Recycling Regulations?

Federal laws don't allow the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to establish national recycling regulations. State and local authorities have the responsibility for recycling programs. This allows for regulations to be based on the needs of the state/ local area, landfill space and the market for recycled materials.

Can I recycle plastic bags?

Not in curbside or county drop-off bins. Most material recovery facilities (MRFs) that accept mixed recyclables cannot process plastic bags. In fact, MRFs have to stop machinery as often as 6-8 times a day to clear the plastic bags that have jammed the system. Locally, plastic bags are accepted for recycling at Buehler's and Wal-Mart.

Can I recycle batteries?

Yes! But not in curbside or county drop-off bins. Locally, batteries are accepted at Coshocton, Warsaw and West Lafayette Post Offices and at Coshocton and West Lafayette Libraries—in "The Big Green Box."

Which recyclables do most people forget?

- * Body wash and mouthwash bottles
- * Medicine bottles
- * Shampoo/Conditioner bottles
- * Food boxes

Think Spring! Green Cleaning Tips

- Use one-part vinegar and one-part water to clean almost anything
 – grease, mildew and soap scum. Do not use vinegar on marble, granite or stone.
- Remove stains on countertops, cutting boards and stainless steel with a paste made of baking soda and a little water.
- Salt and a little scrubbing can cut through tough grease on frying pans.
- · Lemon juice can remove hard water deposits and soap scum.
- Sprinkle baking soda on carpet to control odors. Allow to sit overnight before vacuuming.
- Save those spray bottles and foaming soap dispensers to reuse with your new favorite homemade cleaner.
- Reduce waste by using old t-shirts or re-usable towels and sponges instead of paper towels.
