A "Wild" Night for Conservation: Coshocton SWCD's 83rd Annual Meeting

The Coshocton Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) hosted its 83rd Annual Meeting and Banquet at Lake Park Pavilion on Thursday, October 16, 2025. Over 190 area residents and guests gathered to

> celebrate conservation, enjoy a delicious buffet from Theo's Restaurant of Cambridge, and have a little fun while doing it.

The evening kicked off with a Supervisor of Board election for two candidates. Kristy Leindecker was re-elected, and Jordan Thompson was elected to a threeyear term starting January 1, 2026.

Guests were treated to a live raptor demonstration by Raptor Hallow Sanctuary. Attendees got up close and personal with a snake, hawks, vultures, and falcons in the "Meet & Greet" and "What is a Raptor?" programs. The bird ambassador's shared fascinating facts about each bird—sharp talons, curved beaks, and eyesight so good they'd probably spot your hidden snack from a mile away. The presentation combined awe, education, and a gentle reminder that if you ever hear a bird shriek, it's probably just saying hello. The presentation captivated all

ages and underscored the importance of wildlife conservation.

The 2025 Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year Award was presented to Haines role in the ecosystem Angus Farm of Monroe Township. The 161-

acre farm supports 45 cow/calf pairs, 10 club calves, and two bulls grazing on 80 acres of pasture, in addition to 350 acres of hay production. With guidance from the SWCD and NRCS, Rick Haines implemented numerous conservation practices, including spring developments, access road, watering facilities, fencing, pipelines, waste storage structure, concrete heavy use pads, and an active

Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plan. The Haines Farm hosted several education events such as pasture walks and Fall Foliage & Farm Tour. Rick participated in First Farm Friday since its first inception in 2011 bringing a beef cow to the event. He served as a 4-H advisor for 12 years and was a Coshocton County Farm Bureau member. Rick is survived by his mother, Janet Haines Aronhalt, wife Billie Jo, Son Andrew, Daughter Ashley, and 4 grandkids. Honoring the memory of Rick Haines, congratulations to the 2025 Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year, Haines Angus Farm.

Coshocton SWCD also recognized winners of the 2025 Coshocton County Junior Fair Hay Show. Sponsored by SWCD and judged by Cassie Putt of TMK Bakersville, winners included Julia Adams (Mohawk Valley 4-H, Alfalfa and Mixed Hay), Nathan Adams (RV FFA, Clover Hay), Coleston Hunter (This-N-That 4-H, Grass Hay), and Shiloh Kinzel (River View FFA, Light Mixed Hay). Each received a rosette and \$25 cash prize.

The district honored Giffen Family Farm for the County Big Tree Contest, with a sycamore tree measuring 180 inches in circumference, 76 feet in height, and a 77-foot average crown spread. The City Big Tree Contest award was presented by the Coshocton Tree Commission, went to an oak tree at the Sam Trubee residence, measuring 187 inches in circumference, 78 feet tall, with an 89-foot crown spread.

Kameron Blair was announced as the winner of the Mystery Photo Contest, held at the Coshocton County Fair. Kameron's name was drawn from 23 correct entries and the mystery photo depicted the Johnson Stock Farm in Perry Township.

The evening concluded by honoring two local legends. Greg Waters retired from the CSWCD Board of Supervisors after seven terms on the Board, starting in 2005. His service was described as "steadfast, loyal, and passionate about conservation." Darla Markley retired from Farm Service Agency after an extraordinary 41-year career with FSA, dedicating herself to the Coshocton agricultural community. Both were presented with gifts and well wishes, with the hope that their retirement includes fewer meetings and more relaxation.

From raptors to rosettes, the evening celebrated the people, animals, and trees that make Coshocton a truly remarkable place—proving once again that conservation doesn't have to be all work and no play.

Cover Crops in Coshocton County

Coshocton County producers received over 3,150 acres in cost share to apply cover crops to fields from Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District. Coshocton SWCD staff once again coordinated the aerial application of seed with Fisher Crop Care by Air in early September on over 750 acres. Seed for the fly on program was provided by TMK Bakersville and Eastern Ohio Ag. Producers also completed nearly 100% of drilled or broadcast approved acreage showing Coshocton County's commitment to soil conservation.


