#### Ohio TT Update

Mrs. Megan Kvamme, Mr. Kyle Yoder, Mr. Matt Armstead and Mr. Justin Embrey presented the Commissioners with an update on Ohio TT in Coshocton County, also in attendance were Mr. Rusty Dreher and Mrs. Robin Schonauer. Tower #1 in Millcreek is up and live as of last night with 5 of the 10 beta-testers contacted and signed-up to provide feed-back on the service they receive off of that tower. All beta-tester will receive 90 days free services. OhioTT will use the same roll-out method with 10 beta-testers in all tower locations. Beta-tester will be used to provide two weeks' worth of feed-back before additional users are put on the tower for service. All paperwork for the other nine (9) sites has been submitted and the plan is to have those sites up and running by the end of June, as all equipment and software for those towers have been procured and are in OhioTT's possession. This first tower in Millcreek could help connect potentially 400 under served households, the next nine (9) sites could then reach out to possibly 4800 underserved households. The next nine (9) sites will be complete in clusters of three location towers that are close to each other. OhioTT plans to give updates monthly on the number of clients on the towers as well as how the service is at the towers. There has been a lot of interest in the towers both on their website as well as to the call center. Once all existing towers have all equipment needed to offer service, OhioTT will then start to build 11 new towers throughout the county. Service to homes from all towers can be checked both on-line or by calling the call center and providing an address. Most generally, all towers will have a signal reach of 4+ miles out. Once an address has been identified as a maybe, a service truck will be then sent to that location to test signals and if the signal is good, set up could take place that same day. Ohio TT is offering free equipment to all households, a value of \$600.00. Additionally, there will be three(3) service plans to choose from during sign-up as well as an activation fee of \$99.00. OhioTT is excited to be bringing stable internet service to Coshocton County as this is a huge advancement.

#### Sheriff James Crawford-Annual Report

Sheriff James Crawford presented the Commissioners with the 2021 Coshocton County Sheriff's Report. In 2021 Payroll was as follows: Patrol-\$2,559,821.00, Jail-\$1,260,853.00, 911/Dispatch-\$616,410.00, Detective-\$572,454.00 and Court Security-\$102,408.00, payroll accounts for \$67% of the Sheriff's Office yearly expenditures. The Sheriff's office seen sufficient growth in their CCW(Concealed Carry Weapon) licenses, generating over \$72,000 in 2021. In addition to the CCW, the Webchecks for FBI and BCI checks generated over \$25,000 in 2021. The Sheriffs office received 56 foreclosures in 2021. The Coshocton County Sheriff's Office currently tracks and registers 62 sex offenders annually, all of which are current and accounted for in our county. The Sheriff's Office Communications Center received over 34,000 incoming calls plus 10,449 911 calls for service during 2021. The Communications Center is staffed with two employees per shift to answer calls and to dispatch Fire, EMS and Law Enforcement. Answer time to those calls coming into the center are as follows: 0-3 seconds=68%, 4-9 seconds=98% and 10-15 seconds=99%. In the Road Division, the Sheriffs office completed over 2900 incident reports, conducted 2,967 traffic stops and wrote 636 traffic citations. The Road Division also served countless warrants and paper services. The Sheriffs office currently have three(3) K-9 Units, as they were once again blessed in 2021 to have the opportunity to gain a third K-9 with the generosity of The Coshocton County Prosecutor, Jason Given. This allowed them to select an additional handler, Deputy Jeremy Johnson who will work along-side Detective Stone and Deputy Mox as K-9 handlers. In May of 2021, a property and evidence technician was added to the Detective Division. Detective Nancy Wilt was selected for this role and with her years of detective experience and knowledge, it was an ideal fit. The Special Response Team (SRT) is a highly trained and specialized unit that was created to handle high risk situations in Coshocton County and surrounding areas. The SRT is called upon when there is a risk to the safety and security of the citizens of the county. The SRT is on call 24 hours a day/365 days a year and is available to be deployed in a short amount of tie. Some of the missions that SRT is utilized for include High Risk Warrant Services, Barricaded Suspects, Hostage Rescue, Crowd Control, Office and Citizen rescues. The SRT was called upon 9 times in 2021, with 7 of the deployments

being High Risk Warrant Service. Since the inception of the UAS Program in 2016, the program has continued to grow. In 2021, the Sheriff's Office was afforded yet another opportunity to improve its program through a very generous donation of a DJ1 Matrice 300 RTK. 2021 Flight Stats: Flight time-25 Hours and 46 Minutes, Distance Flown-671,134 feet and total flights-89. In 2021 the Jail received 535 male and 215 female inmates, of which the average length of stay was 24 days with an average daily population of 43. Inmates Medical Costs for 2021 was \$291,675.00. The Sheriffs office transport unit consists of 1 full-time Deputy assigned to transporting of inmates to and from Prison to County Jails. The Transport officer traveled over 53,299 miles while stacking up more than 1289.25 hours on the road. He transported 300 males and 133 females to and from prison, he also transported 40 juveniles to the Muskingum Juvenile Detention Center. During 2021, Corrections personnel fed 46,205 meals to inmates at a cost of \$1.98 per meal for a total of \$91,706. The Coshocton County Sheriff's Office in collaboration with the Coshocton County General Health District, held 1 Prescription Drug Take Back Day in 2021, which was very successful, with One hundred pounds collected.
