Executive Session-Security, Mr. Chad Lawrence, IT Director

At 9:00 a.m. Mr. Fischer made a motion, seconded by Mr. Bigrigg to go into executive session with Mr. Chad Lawrence, IT Director to discuss to IT Security. All vote aye. At 9:20 a.m. Mr. Shryock returned the meeting to regular session. No action taken.

Sheriff Christopher Walters, Housing of Prisoners

At 9:30 a.m. Sheriff Christopher Walters and Lieutenant Charles Udischas attended the Commissioners meeting to discuss the jail population. The Sheriff reported that the highest inmate population this year reached 49. The Commissioners asked whether there has been any progress in securing outside prisoners to help offset operating costs.

Lieutenant Udischas noted that although many regional jails currently have open beds, Coshocton has not received any new placements. Surrounding counties have lower housing costs, reducing the demand for additional bed space. Jackson County, which previously contacted Coshocton regularly, no longer does so due to the travel distance. Chip stated that even when the County offered a rate of \$65 per day lower than before—they were still unable to secure rental agreements.

Mrs. Beck reported that representatives from Perry and Wayne counties approached her during a recent conference. Wayne County toured the Coshocton facility but later withdrew their interest. However, the Perry County Administrator remains interested in a potential arrangement.

Mr. Shryock asked whether there was any reason the County should not use its internal listserv system to distribute information advertising available jail space. The Sheriff noted that while federal inmates would require additional staffing, regular county inmates could be accommodated with current personnel levels.

When asked about capacity, Mr. Udischas stated he would be comfortable housing a total of 51 inmates, combining 30 male and 21 female inmates. Staffing is currently four per shift, which meets the minimum state requirement, and cannot be reduced. The jail operates three shifts per day, and command staff must be present 24/7/365. These staffing levels are mandated by the state, not the Sheriff.

Mr. Shryock confirmed that 51 beds could be made available at a daily rate of \$65. Mr. Udischas added that the priority is maintaining adequate space for Coshocton County inmates. Perry County is currently paying \$75 per day to Noble County. All inmates must be housed according to state-required classification standards, which can complicate placement depending on whether individuals are classified as violent or non-violent.

Mr. Shryock stated that any additional revenue would be an improvement over the current situation. He also noted that the County pays \$12 per day for the work program regardless of the number of days inmates participate. Because of multiple state classification and housing requirements, there are many moving parts to consider.

Mr. Bigrigg asked whether other counties advertise available bed space. Mr. Udischas reported that Monroe County sent an email two months ago offering a \$65 rate but received no responses.

Dane discussed broader trends, noting that when the jail was originally constructed, the County consistently housed 70–80 inmates. Since COVID-19, inmate numbers have declined. Additionally, bond reform legislation passed in 2022 has significantly increased the number of defendants able to bond out prior to trial, reducing jail populations statewide. The Fair Bond Reform Act, a state law, requires consideration of danger to the community but still allows broader pre-trial release.

Mr. Shryock also reported that Children Services' foster care costs have dramatically increased. They will require an additional \$2.1 million above last year's Commissioner's allocation. Given these pressures, the County is exploring every possible opportunity to generate revenue before considering budget cuts.

Meetings Attended

All three (3) Commissioners attended the Land Bank meeting on Monday, December 8th. Mr. Bigrigg also attended a Friends of the Park meeting that day as well, additionally on Tuesday, December 9th r. Bigrigg participated in the Leadership Poverty Simulator for the Youth Leadership Class.
