Description of the Site and Environmental Context

The project consists of replacing undersized waterline and fire hydrants and re-connecting households to the waterline. The existing waterlines are more than 60 years old and experiences frequent breaks leading to depressurization and contamination. Flow is insufficient for fire protection; 2 fires in the last 5 years have required mutual aid due to lack of flow and resulted in total property loss. These trends will continue in the absence of the project.

Coshocton County Fire Safety Improvements & Waterline Replacement Service Area Map




Exhibit B: Project Location Map


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
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Coshocton County Fire Safety Improvements & Waterline Replacement FEMA FIRM Map




Exhibit D: Ohio Coastal Area Map






Exhibit E: Sole Source Aquifer Map



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


Exhibit J: Project Area Soil Sheet

Coshocton County Fire Safety Improvements & Waterline Replacement Critical Infrastructure PY 2020

Waterline Replacement

The proposed project would replace waterlines on two major streets in the neighborhood, N. 8th Street and N. 9th Street in the City of Coshocton. Grandview Avenue and Northview Street are secondary streets where waterlines will also be replaced. In total, 2,913 Linear Feet of 8-inch waterlines and four fire hydrants will be installed on these streets. Ninetyone (91) households will be re-connected to the waterline; however, 221 households and 619 individuals will benefit due to the fire protection benefits provided by the increased capacity of the new waterlines. Ten (10) 8-inch gate valves/boxes will be installed and one (1) 8-inch tapping valve/sleeve. The water services included in the cost estimate serve to re-connect houses to the new 8" waterline that are currently connected to the existing waterline; these are not new service laterals. This project does not include the construction of new residential service lines. Households connected to the waterline being replaced must be re-connected to the line. The Engineer's water service line item in the Cost Estimate to connect the 91 households includes costs for a tap with corporation stop, water service line within the right of way, and new curb stop at the right of way. Documentation of the current waterline size and age is not available; the project engineer stated the waterline is at least 60 years old. The only improvements that have been made have been for waterline break repairs. Currently, a waterline break occurs once every other year; breaks like these can cause the waterline to depressurize and lead to contamination of the water supply.

Fire Service

As you can see in the attached photos, fire hydrants in the neighborhood are visibly beyond their useful life. This project includes the installation of four fire hydrants, two on N. 8th Street and two on N. 9th Street. According to the Chief of the Coshocton Fire Department, Michael Layton, the Fire Department has responded to 179 incidents in this area since 2000 with 16 considered a working fire in a residential area. In the attached letter, Chief Layton notes an August 2015 working fire at 508 N. 8th Street where the water supply from the hydrant in front of the residence had to be supplemented by neighboring departments and water was hauled in to battle the fire. Though improvements were made, the Coshocton Fire Department could not maintain enough water from the same hydrant to extinguish a fire at 820 Grandview Avenue in January 2018. The Department utilizes Mutual Aid agreements with neighboring departments and water tenders to aid in extinguishment. The Chief noted the considerable amount of time these actions add to response times and describes these project improvements as a "must" for the safety of citizens and fire personnel. Sufficiently sized waterlines will restore function and efficiency to fire hydrants and greatly improve fire protection. The project engineer stated the waterline is undersized for fire protection and does not currently provide adequate fire flows. The increase in fire flows from improved waterlines and fire hydrants will help protect the homes and individuals in the area from future fires, whereby addressing a critical need. The life of the replaced infrastructure should be extended at least fifty years.

Service Benefit Area

The Coshocton Waterline/Fire Improvement Project falls in three separate census tract block groups in the City of Coshocton. Though the project does not fall in one block group in its entirety, the benefit area captures a residential neighborhood. Each block group and household, as identified by the City, was included in the benefit area because of the locations of the existing undersized watermains and lack of adequate water flows for fire protection. Those By 2011-2015 LMI Census Tract and Block Group Data for Ohio, the three block groups are LMI. In Block Group 390319613002 (80.26% LMI), 135 households will benefit, approximately 378 individuals when the average of 2.8 individuals per household is applied. Sixty-nine (69) benefiting households are part of Block Group 390319615001 (75.35% LMI) with 193 individuals benefiting. Seventeen (17) benefiting households are a part of Block Group 390319615002 (82.14% LMI) and benefit 48 individuals. In total, 221 households and 619 individuals will benefit from the proposed waterlines and fire protection improvements. The benefit area, as compiled in OCEAN, is 79% LMI. Other households are not considered part of the benefit area as outside areas have sufficiently sized waterlines and functioning fire hydrants to serve their households.

This letter is in response to correspondence received on September 23, 2020 concerning the waterline and fire hydrant replacement project in the City of Coshocton, Coshocton County, Ohio. We appreciate the opportunity to comment on this project. The comments of the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) are made in accordance with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, and the associated regulations at 36 CFR Part 800.

The proposed project will involve the replacement of 2,913 LF of 8-inch waterline and four fire hydrants along N. 8th Street, N. 9th Street, Grandview Avenue, and Northview Street. In addition, ten 8-inch gate valves/boxes and one 8-inch tap valve/sleeve will also be installed. A total of 91 households will be reconnected to the new waterline upon completion. The entire planned activities will take place within the existing disturbed right-of-way of the aforementioned streets. According to the information provided by you and a check of our records, no historic properties or districts are documented along these streets. Given this and previous disturbances associated with utility and street construction, it is my opinion that this project, as proposed, will have no effect to historic properties. No further coordination is required for this project unless the scope of work changes or archaeological remains are discovered during the course of project construction. In such a situation, this office should be contacted as required by 36 CFR § 800.13.

Coshocton County is proposing a 2020 CDBG Community Development project in the City of Coshocton that needs to be reviewed in coordination with your office. Enclosed are photographs, a project description as submitted and maps.

Coshocton County is proposing to replace 2,913 linear feet of undersized waterline and 4 fire hydrants. The project also includes reconnecting 91 households to the replaced waterline. The waterlines are more than 60 years old and experience frequent breaks leading to depressurization and contamination. The flow is insufficient for fire protection; 2 fires in the past 5 years have required mutual aid to the lack of flow and resulted in total property loss. This project should be reviewed by your office as part of an Environmental Assessment and Review of the proposed project.




